"MUGSY" MCGRAW SUSPENDED FOR TREATMENT OF UMPIRES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22--The indefinite suspension of Manager John J. McGraw, of the Giants, is taken here as the opening gun in the campaign of President Lynch against umpire baiting in the National League. Lynch's action, however, is likely to alienate the New York club, and may prevent his re-election as president.

That he is firm in his determination to stop umpire baiting is shown by his declaration.

"I won't stand for any attempts to incite the crowds against umpires. From the first I have been determined that the decisions will go and go without rowdiness. The Giants behaved better than almost any other club till the Pittsburgh-New York series started. Then McGraw got nasty."

The incident that determined President Lynch to act against McGraw was the escorting from the grounds by the police of Umpire Charles Rigler, who with Umpire Robert Emslie, had failed to please the New York manager.

Lynch became president on a platform consisting chiefly of umpire reform and protection for the umpires. He says he is determined to carry out that policy. He was formerly an umpire himself.

DETAILS OF MANAGUA FALL.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24--The final word of the passing into history of the Madriz government at Managua has been received at the State Department in a despatch from the American Consul at Managua. The message dated Saturday, told of the disorder which preceded the downfall of Madriz at Managua, the escape of the President as shots were fired at his train and the assumption of the presidency by Estrada and the command of the troops by the brothers of the revolutionary leader, General Juan Estrada.

A message from Estrada pledged Nicaragua to reparation for shooting Cannon and Groce, Americans executed by Zelaya.

\$800 ENVELOPE STOLEN FROM DESK.

TORONTO, August 22--A large pay envelope containing over \$800, intended as pay for the men, was stolen from the offices of the Dominion Bridge company in Confederation Life building, on Saturday night. The weekly pay about \$1,500 in all, was placed in two large envelopes and laid on the desk of George Evans, the manager, shortly before noon. Shortly after it was placed there Mr. Evans went to luncheon. A few moments after his departure a stranger appeared and asked for Mr. Evans. He was told the latter would be back in a few moments and asked to wait in his office. After a short delay the man again appeared from the inner office saying he was busy and would not wait, but would return in the afternoon. He went out and has not been seen since.

THE GREAT PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION AT HALIFAX.

It will be Held From September 28th to October 6th, and will be More Attractive Than Ever.

The Nova Scotia exhibition at Halifax this year will be just as attractive as any of the big provincial fairs of the past. It will run from September 28th to October 6th. It will be the fourteenth annual provincial exhibition, and the experience that has been gained will be used to make it the greatest and best yet.

The exhibition will have all the good features of past displays and it will have new attractions. The premium list shows an aggregate fund for the prize list amounting to \$20,000. For the horse races, which will take place daily on the half-mile track, there are purses totalling \$6,200.

The fisheries, agriculture, fruit, mines, manufactures, machinery, the women's work and fine arts departments, will have exhibits that will repay careful study and examination. A gentleman writing to Halifax from Paris says that several splendid paintings from the salons of the French capital will be sent to the exhibition to add to the collection which will be shown from Halifax and other Canadian artists.

The rates of travel to Halifax will be as low as usual, so that the people of Nova Scotia may go in great crowds to the capital, and while enjoying a splendid exhibition, also have a holiday pleasant in other ways and a fine period of recreation generally.

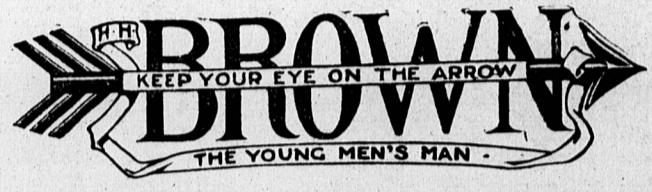
