Keen Balance Necessary For Empire Tariff

Protection for Canadian Products With Admittance of Selected Empire Goods Needs Much Study.

OTTAWA, July 24.—In a country with a single-class, high-protectionist tariff, such as the United States, it is not necessary to inquire very closely into the question whether all of the articles covered by a given item of that tariff, in all of their grades and varieties, can advantageously be manufactured in the country or not. Those grades and varieties which the country cannot produce will be imported anyhow, and the duty on them will contribute to the revenue, and if the consumer does not complain too loudly there is nothing to consider.

But the administration of a graded preferential tariff system such as that which is now developing in the countries of the British Empire needs much more scientific adjustment, and in particular, it needs a much more definite decision, and a much clearer definition, in the tariff schedules, as to the articles, grades and varieties which it is desired to produce from other Empire countries.

The company will issue 300 shares of no par value to be distributed among the ship-owners making up the association.

Nfld. Party To Conference

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., July 25.—Reaching Canada's shores today from Newfoundland the delegate from that Dominion headed by the Prime Minister Hon. F. C. Alderdice arrived here this morning and left via the Canadian National Railway for Ottawa. They will reach Montreal on the Ocean Limited Sunday night, leaving the same evening for their destination on the Continental Limited. Included in the party in addition to Hon. F. C. Alderdice, Prime Minister, are: J. H. Penson, Deputy Minister of Finance; H. P. Hutchings, Deputy Minister of Customs; Hon. F. A. McNamara, leader of the Legislative Council and member of the Cabinet, also President Newfoundland Board of Trade; W. J. Carewe, Secretary to Prime Minister; Claud Noonan, member of Council, Newfoundland Board of Trade and director of Fish Department, Harvey and Co.; John Powell, director Saunders, Howell Ltd., lumber merchants; Wilfred Dave, director William Dave and Son, Bay Roberts, lumber merchants; Hon. New Zealand Market For Canadian Autos

AN EMPIRE FLAG SUGGESTED

TORONTO, July 25.—(By the Canadian Press)—Recognition of distinctive national flags and emblems for each nation of the British Commonwealth and fusion of those emblems into an Empire flag to be approved by the present Imperial Conference are suggested in a letter forwarded to Premier R. B. Bennett and Imperial Conference delegates by Dr. James Cotton, Toronto, on behalf of the native sons of Canada.

Dr. Cotton claims that Canada and other units of the Empire should be given a place or recognition in an Empire flag in order to "prove that the so-called British Empire no longer ignores their existence."
