The bride carried a bouquet of white roses, and was becomingly attired in a gown of pale green silk with lace and white, with lace and applique trimmings, and wore a bridal veil, caught up with orange blossoms. After the ceremony the guests repaired to the dining room, where a dainty wedding supper awaited them. The remainder of the evening was pleasantly spent in music, etc. The large number of presents received, highly attested the popularity of both bride and groom.

QUAHAUG fishers will be interested in the following: An order in council has been passed at Ottawa making the following regulations governing the hard shell clam or quahaug fishery and the same are hereby made and established accordingly: No one shall fish or catch hard shell clams or quahaugs without a license from the minister of marine and fisheries. The fee on each license shall be \$1 per season. No one shall fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or possess hard shell clams or quahaugs, excepting during the months of May, June and September in each year. No one shall fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or possess hard shell clams or quahaugs less than one and one-quarter inches in length, and if any such hard shell clams or quahaugs measuring less than one and one-quarter inches in length, on the outer shell may be accidentally caught, shall be returned to the water by the person so fishing. The use of rakes for catching hard shell clams or quahaugs, having teeth less than one and one-quarter inches apart, is prohibited. Oyster fishery regulations have been amended as follows. Oysters shall not be bought, sold or had in possession from the 1st day of April to the 30th day of September, both days inclusive, in each year. The use for taking oysters on oyster beds, of quahaug rakes, tongs operated by purchase power, or tongs or rakes other than the ordinary ones now in use in oyster fishing in the provinces of Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick is prohibited.
