ROTARY LUNCHEON.—At the Rotary Luncheon yesterday Dr. H. D. Johnson presided. The guests were Messrs M. F. Tompkins and P. W. Clarkin of the C.N.R. and J. C. Moomaw, the new American Consul, and J. P. Melniss. Rotarian A. E. Morrison read a very interesting paper on "Dust" showing the very important part it plays in the workings of nature, in the various physical changes which are going on in the universe. Dr. W. J. MacMillan, chairman of a committee to enquire into the reasons for the discontinuance of the cadet competition between West Kent and Queen Square Schools reported that this was done at the request of the teachers on the ground that it took up too much time from studies at an important stage of the school term. The matter was further discussed by Rotarians Col. MacKinnon, J. H. Malcolm, R. H. D. Johnson and R. H. Rogers. It being pointed out by the last named that though the competition would not be held this year, the drill would go on just the same. President Percy W. Turner read a letter from the Secretary of the Charlottetown Orchestral Society, thanking the Rotarians for attending the recent concert in a body and giving practical encouragement to the Society. Rotarian W. K. Rogers brought up the chance in the "rule of the road" recently adopted in Nova Scotia. The Island is the only place in North America where a "drive to the left" is now the rule. He urged some action by the Rotary Club. The matter was further discussed by Col. MacKinnon, J. A. Webster, Dr. Johnson and J. O. Hyndman. It was pointed out that the Rotary Club might get behind any movement to bring about the change, but it was not competent for them to take the initial step. Rotarian Hyndman suggested having the matter taken up at the Executive meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade to be held in Charlottetown next Tuesday night. The musical programme yesterday included an excellent solo by Mr. McInnis.

U. S. Inquires Into Railway Management

WASHINGTON, April 18.—As a part of its inquiry into efficiency and economy of railroad management, the Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered the 51 largest U. S. railroads to furnish under oath response to a questionnaire covering the labor conditions in their maintenance departments and the general situation in regard to fitness of their equipment.

JAPANESE WOMEN VERY ADVANCED. TORONTO, April 18.—Three eminent Japanese medical men now visiting Toronto are much amazed over the part women are playing in the affairs of Japan. The doctors, who are touring the country and the United States for the purpose of furthering their knowledge of hospital equipment, university instruction styles, X-ray treatment, clinical and surgical methods, are Professor Miyuki, dean of the Faculty of Medicine at the Imperial University of Kyushu; Dr. Hata, professor of biology and medicine at Kio University and Baron Takaki, professor in surgery at the University of Tokyo.
