# Rob Roy Macgregor

## Some Interesting Facts About The Hero Of Scottish Romance.

A famous man was Rob Roy Hood. The English ballad singer's joy, But Scotland has a thief as good—She has, she has, her bold Rob Roy!

Who has not heard of Rob Roy, that daring Highlandman whose adventurous career furnished Sir Walter Scott with the theme of one of his most popular novels. Born about 1698, Rob Roy was the son of Duncan MacGregor, of Glen-gyle, a frugal and hard working man, who by steady industry had become possessed of a small estate, and was greatly esteemed and respected by his neighbors. In addition to his regular occupation of cattle dealer, Duncan carried on the business of "blackmiller" and derived considerable revenue from the "blackmail" paid by lairds and farmers for the protection of their herds and flocks from Highland raiders.

To this joint business of cattle dealer and blackmiller, accordingly was young Rob trained, and soon became adept. His robust and muscular frame could withstand any degree of fatigue, and his extraordinary strength of limb, coupled with the uncommon length of arm and a dexterous use of the broadsword, made him respected by his clansmen and feared by his enemies. Of an impulsive and fiery character, his early associations amidst the dark and sombre mountains had imparted a gloomy tinge to his mind, and when in later years he brooded over the wrongs which he had undeservedly suffered, it is not surprising that few people could speak well of him. His general appearance was rendered more striking by the mass of red hair, which earned for him the nickname of Rob Roy or "Red Robert."

As a deputy for his father in his blackmilling business, he early made himself famous. A party of the MacRas from the west coast of Ross had raided the property of Finlarig Castle and carried off 15

On one occasion Graham of Killearn was dining peacefully in the inn of Chapellarroch, having collected his rents under the impression that Rob was far distant. Suddenly the MacGregor and the money bags were hastily thrown into a loft for concealment. Rob pleasantly partook of the refreshments, and Killearn thought his money to be safe. MacGregor, however, gave a sign; six of his men entered and after a search found the money bags, for which Rob kindly gave them a receipt.

Killearn was notoriously harsh and greatly disliked by the tenants on the estate. A poor widow who had been in arrears with her rent, and was threatened with eviction, appealed to Rob for aid. Rob, who satisfied his conscience by helping the poor when he robbed their landlords, provided the money to pay the arrears, telling the

# London Letter

LONDON, Sept. 28. (U.P.)—A woman inventor has built and perfected what is claimed to be the first "home talkie machine."

Perched on the roof of a building in Soho (London's Greenwich Village) is a tiny laboratory in which Mrs. Sheldon Wilkinson, said to be England's cleverest talking machine recording expert, has experimented for three years. Her object was to find a way to synchronize talking machine records with moving pictures, with an apparatus so simple that it would enable her to build a small and portable machine for the home.

During the past few months she has travelled extensively over Europe, making tests with her portable. She has taken talks in railroad trains, parks, streets and embassies. Distinguished people who have spoken into her home-talkie include the late Dictator of Spain, General Primo de Rivera, the late Spanish Ambassador to Britain, the Marquis Merry del Val, several other Ambassadors and numerous personalities well known in all walks of life from science to politics.

**Healthful Apple Recipes**

We have been talking a lot about apples, lately, and will probably continue to say things about them off and on, the fact that they are based on apples makes them worth cultivating because it is the one fruit that seemingly cannot be overdone in the diet.

**Apple Fritter**

Mix and sift one and one-half cups of flour, two teaspoons of baking powder, and one-fourth teaspoon of salt. Add gradually, while stirring constantly, two-thirds of a cup of milk and one egg well beaten. Wipe core, pare and cut into eight or two medium sized sour apples, then slice the eighth and stir into the batter. Drop by spoonfuls into a pan of deep fat and fry until delicately browned, drain on brown paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

**Fried Apples**

Cut the apples in slices, 1-4 in thick. Sauté in butter or dripping till tender. Serve with bacon or pork chops.

**Baked Apples With Marshmallows**

2 firm red apples  
2 tablespoons sugar  
4 Marshmallows  
Water

Core apples and peel about one inch of the skin from the stem end. Place the apples in a baking dish, fill centres with sugar and cover the bottom of the dish with water. Bake in a hot oven, basting every ten minutes. When sugar has dissolved put a marshmallow in the centre of each apple. When tender remove from oven, place the second marshmallow on top and bake a minute or two longer. Serve hot or cold.

**Apples Fried With Onions**

Peel onions and slice. Fry in fat until a rich brown, drain on soft brown paper. Fry unpared quarters of apple in fat left from the onions. Arrange apples in a border on a platter, fill centre with the fried onions and serve hot.

**Apple Ginger Marmalade**

Pare the apples and cut in quarters or eighth. Make a syrup of 1 cup of sugar to 3-4 cup water and 2 ounces of preserved ginger cut in fine pieces. Simmer to apples in the syrup till clear and thick. Seal in sterilized glasses.

**Apples Fried With Onions**

Peel onions and slice. Fry in fat until a rich brown, drain on soft brown paper. Fry unpared quarters of apple in fat left from the onions. Arrange apples in a border on a platter, fill centre with the fried onions and serve hot.

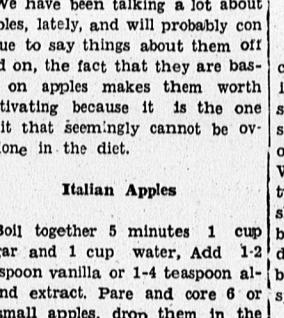

As soon as the film is developed and ready to be shown, the machine will act as a talkie and reproduce both the record and the picture with synchronization as perfect as can be seen in the best talkie theatres.
