Seek Recruits To C.W.A.C. In Province
Captain Ruth Creelock, Officer Commanding the Canadian Women's Army Corps in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland arrived in Charlottetown last night to carry on a recruiting campaign. She is in Summerside today but will return to Charlottetown tomorrow.
The purpose of her visit here is primarily to get recruits but she will also answer questions concerning the work of the Women's Army. Captain Creelock says that hundreds of recruits are needed from Prince Edward Island, trained or untrained. The minimum standard of education is grade VIII. If recruits have a High School education but no particular trade, they can train for a certain trade in the Army. Recruits are wanted as drivers, dental assistants, cooks, typists. The Army needs at least 100 trained stenographers; also telephone operators, typists, qualified laboratory technicians, X-Ray technicians and radio operators.
Sgt. Taylor of the Canadian Women's Army Corps has been here for several weeks in the office of the Malvern recruiting officer. Some of her recruits are already in training in other parts of Canada and she has many other prospects. Captain Creelock's headquarters are at Halifax.

Fresh U.S. Troops Arrive In Egypt
CAIRO, AUG. 18 — (AP) — United States army bombers have gone into action in North Africa along with heavy bombers. The U.S. Army has announced that American-operated medium bombers have been used in an attack on Mersa Matruh. The attack coincided with raids by heavy bombers on harbor installations at Tobruk and shipping in the Mediterranean.
The new American troops included ground staffs for United States units already operating in the desert.
The arrival of the new troops brought the first of the new type United States army helmets seen in the Middle East. The helmet is made of the German type that was worn by the British troops and, as a result, it attracted considerable attention. More than 100 British sentry gripped his rifle tightly for a moment until he realized the wearers were American and not stay German.
United States heavy bombers have been operating in North Africa for more than two months and it was announced only yesterday that American airmen who have been operating in R.A.F. fighter planes for their final desert training were now ready to be assigned to United States units.
An official report on the latest U.S. raids, Aug. 14-15, said all the bombers returned safely from the attacks. The heavy bombers set fire to an Axis mechanized unit in the Mediterranean. The medium bombers encountered heavy anti-aircraft fire over Mersa Matruh, but were not damaged.

More Fighting Is Prospected In Middle East
OTTAWA, Aug. 18—(CP)—More fighting is in prospect in Egypt, Sir Herbert Morrison, former secretary of the Ministry of State in the Middle East, for the United Kingdom government said at a press conference here today.
He did not know which side would take the offensive but said he felt things can not remain as they are. "It would suit either side to stay where they are indefinitely," he said. "The line is much too close to Alexandria to suit us and the situation is not comfortable for him (the enemy). So he will want to get on and we will want to get him out."
Sir Walter came to North America to address the American Bar Association at Detroit late this week and leaves for Toronto tonight. He will speak to the Canadian Institute on International Affairs at Lake Couchiching, Ont., tomorrow and then go on to Detroit.
He spent six weeks in England on his return from extensive travels in Russia, the Middle East and Africa. He visited the front battle area shortly before the recent fighting began and the Germans drove the British back.
"One of the good things about this war is that the big fellows meet each other face to face," he said, speaking of Prime Minister Churchill's conferences with Stalin at Moscow. He was quite sure the two would understand each other.
From his experiences in Russia during the German drive for Moscow last year he was impressed with the "patient endurance and quiet confidence of the Russians. They had something of the spirit of the east which it was hard for men from the new world to understand."

Every Bit Of Rubber Scrap Needed

OTTAWA, Aug. 18—(CP)—Operators of commercial vehicles who fail to make efficient use of their tires may be refused renewal by tire ration representatives, supplies controller Alan H. Williamson, told newspapermen today in a review of the rubber situation.
Those who overload their trucks or otherwise abuse their tires unnecessarily may be refused replacements. Mr. Williamson said. "Instructions to this effect are going out to the tire ration officers throughout the country.
"In addition, quotas on tires for commercial users are being applied in line with the quantities on hand in the bank and probable requirements during the next two years. Those who use more tires than they would be entitled to under normal wear and tear conditions will have trouble obtaining replacements."
Continued collection of rubber for reclaim purposes was essential. Piles of salvaged rubber in various parts of Canada represented the success of collection drives, and all would be moved to reclaiming plants. But further contributions to such piles were urgently required and no unused rubber should remain hidden.
