"Tea For Three" Is Hilariously Amusing

LEW CODY AND ALLEN PRINGLE SCORE AN EVEN GREATER SUCCESS THAN WAS PREDICTED FOR THEM AS A DISTINGUISHED COMEDY TEAM.

If you don't want to laugh until your sides split keep away from the Prince Edward Theatre, where "Tea for Three," a co-starring vehicle for Lew Cody and Allen Pringle is being shown.

This excellent new screen team, which established their worth in their first production, "Adam and Evil," has proved to be even more of a success than was predicted by their most ardent admirers.

"Tea for Three" is based on Rol Cooper Meguire's famous stage farce that took the country by storm a few years ago and which was laughed at by millions of theatregoers.

As a screen play, adapted by E. Hugh Herbert, it is even funnier than it was as a stage vehicle. Cody and Pringle exactly fit into the roles and give convincing performances as the husband and wife whose matrimonial bark almost wrecks upon a triangular reef—with Owen Moore as the reef.

It is a story of three friends, a married couple and a young bachelor who are in the habit of having tea together. Because her husband is tied up in a business conference the wife and friend meet quite accidentally at a downtown luncheon. Because the salad was seasoned with garlic the husband immediately knew when they show up for tea that they have lunched together.

The result is a suspicion that, maybe they are having an affair. The husband is later convinced this is true and demands that his friend cut cards with him to determine which shall commit suicide at the conclusion of twenty-four hours.

Cody and Pringle, who have played the friend, declares he will steal Cody's wife before the twenty-four hours have elapsed. The remainder of the story is taken up by the husband's efforts to guard his wife and by Moore's return to earth after a fake suicide which leads them all to believe they had better cast suspicion and jealousy aside and resume their daily "tea for three."

Thrills And Laughs At The Capitol

A word to the wise is sufficient. If you're wise, you'll make it a point to go to the Capitol Theatre today or tomorrow and enjoy one of the most charming comedies presented here in many months. It is "The Wise Wife," a De Mille picture in which Phyllis Haver, Tom Moore, Jacqueline Logan and Joseph Striker are featured. Their artist, not to speak of the able direction by E. Mason Hopper contributed largely to the fine success achieved by the production on its initial showing yesterday.

A wise wife is one who knows how to handle her recalcitrant husband without shattering their love romance. Miss Haver does it with ease in this delicious story. A staid, domestic creature, she blossoms forth into a flapper that makes the flapper vamp in the story look like thirty cents. She is fighting for a big stake—her husband's love—and after numerous rebuffs she emerges from the struggle a smiling victor. Tom Moore is a real husband while Miss Logan as the flapper and Mr. Striker as the latter's fiancé, lend adequate support.

"The Second Hundred Years" a two reel comedy also contributes its share of laughs.
