NO ICE—NOW NO REFRIG.—No new electric refrigerators will be imported into Canada after the end of the month, the Prices Board announced. The stock of electric refrigerators was shipped last year from stocks built up under the rationing system. Since April 1 one hundred machines have been released each month and at the present time there are only 125 of the new domestic-type refrigerator left in stock in Canada, or the equivalent of one day's supply in normal times. These will be exhausted at the end of the month.

PRICES VIOLATIONS.—Seventy-six persons were prosecuted in Canada for violations of the War-time Price and Rationing regulations during the week ending August 18, the Prices Board announced. Infractions of the gasoline rationing regulations continued to be the most numerous, with 33 of the cases resulting in a fine of \$400 where an individual wholesaler for unlawful possession of gasoline ration coupons. The business licenses of two Montreal wholesale food dealers were suspended for repeated infractions of price ceiling orders. Six car dealers and three other persons were convicted of carrying on a business more than ceiling price. Five property owners were fined for increasing rents and two others for discontinuing services which they had been supplying previously.
