The plane, which only weighs 390 lbs., is carrying a weight of 600 lbs., which includes a coapsible life-boat, oars, flares, tools, five extra gallons of gasoline and one gallon of oil. In addition to this they had only a change of clothing, some beans and water.

The maximum speed of the plane is 100 miles per hour, the cruise speed is 85 and Pilot Wingerter states that he made the trip from Bimini to Nassau in 1 3/4 hours including a stop at Andros which he made in order to watch the fishing methods used by the people. As soon as they have thoroughly overhauled their ship they will leave for Porto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Trinidad and Brazil.

The huge air liners of the Pan American Miami-Nassau service have gone in service with a daily flight schedule. Carrying twenty passengers each and a radio equipped to have contact with their base each two minutes off flight they will prove the come of air travel comfort. At the Pan American International air port in Miami, the largest fleet of air liners is now assembling to take care of the season's traffic to the West Indies and South America. The city of Miami making the most of its opportunities, is planning a great all American Air Meet next week which the Governor of the Bahamas, Sir Charles Orr, K.C.M.G. has been invited to attend. His Excellency hopes to avail himself of this invitation and will leave Nassau on the afternoon of the 8th, returning on the morning of the 10th. As a friendly gesture the Governor is offering a Challenge Cup for Formation Flying to be competed for annually by the three branches of the United States Air Service, the Army, the Navy and the Marine Corps.

Destructive Fire At Caledonia

The dwelling house of Mr. John Cameron, a highly respected farmer of this district, was completely destroyed by fire Saturday afternoon, January 10th. Is 500 Years Since Joan's Death

BRITISH AS WELL AS FRENCH NOW CONTRIBUTING TO MEMORIAL TO MARTYRED MAID.

ROUEN, France, Jan. 14.—It was 500 years on November 21 last that St. Joan of Arc was sold into British hands, and was put to death by fire on May 30, 1431, at Rouen. In connection with her martyrdom celebrations will be held on the quincentenary of the death of "The Maid of Orleans," and British as well as French will take part therein.

A chapel is to be built at Rouen as a memorial to St. Joan, and on May 30 next its foundation-stone will be laid by the Archbishop of Rouen, on the initiative of a French committee. The memorial will be erected on the spot where St. Joan was executed, in the old market-place of Rouen. The chapel will be small and delicate, conceived in the spirit of the 15th century, with flint base and upper parts of timber, so as to harmonize with the historic buildings of the square.

Meanwhile in order that Britain may have a share in this final atonement to St. Joan a national appeal has been launched from London under the presidency of Cardinal Bourne, and with the distinguished support of such representative men and women as Great Britain's Ambassador to France, Lord Crewe, Lady Warwick, Lady Haig of Bemeray, Lady Rhonda, the Rev. H. R. L. Shppard, Rt. Hon. George Lansbury, M. P., First Commissioner of Works; Sir Henry Wood, Sir Johnstone Forbes-Robertson, Dame Rachel Crowdy, Mrs. Corbett Ashby, Miss Megan Lloyd George, M. P., Mrs. Bramwell Booth, Mrs. George Cadbury, Miss Amy Johnson, Rev. F. W. Norwood, George Bernard Shaw, Miss Sybil Thorndike, Hugh Walpole, and others.

It is hoped that a sufficient sum will be collected to provide the church with its main door, on which, in the words of the Archbishop of Rouen, "it will be beautiful to read the witness to the generosity of noble England."

Miss Sheila Kaye-Smith, London, author of a number of works, is honorary treasurer of the fund being raised in that country in connection with the quincentenary memorial.
