PRODUCE N. Y. CURB

(Canadian Press) MONTRÉAL, Dec. 11—A seven to eight cent decline in egg prices featured the produce and dairy market here last week. Increased production forced prices lower and at the end of the week graded Ontario fresh eggs, in cartons or less, were quoted at 29 to 30 cents for extras, 28 to 29 cents for firsts and 27 to 28 cents for seconds. Storage eggs, in cartons, remained unchanged at 22 to 23 cents for extras, 18 to 19 cents for firsts and 16 to 17 cents for seconds. As a result of the dip in carton prices, quotations of fresh eggs, in cartons, to retailers eased six cents a dozen and a further decrease was announced at the close of the week to take effect Monday. Last week's receipts were 5,856 cases. Butter, cheese and potatoes remained firm last week with demand quiet in all three lines. For carlots or less of no. 1 finest grass butter, 21 1/2 to 21 3/4 cents a pound was quoted at the end of the week. Receipts for the week were 1,573 boxes. Current receipts of Ontario colored cheese were quoted at 9 1/2 to 9 3/4 cents with current Ontario white at 8 1/2 to 8 3/4 cents a pound. Hearty demand for cheese was 10 1/2 to 11 cents a pound. Receipts last week were 1,568 boxes. New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island green mountain potatoes, per 80 pound bag held steady at 80 cents and Prince Edward Island green mountains, per 90 pound bag at \$1.00.

EXCHANGE (Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 11—British currencies closed the week presented a strong tone. The pound sterling closed Saturday 2 1/2 cents higher on foreign exchange at 82 1/2 for India and the Canadian dollar ended the day 9-16 cent stronger at 86-1/2 cents (premium of 16 1/2 cents percent on United States funds). DEATH OF MR. H. M. DOWNING, SUMMERSIDE

Prominent Citizen of Prince Co. Capital Passed Away on Saturday.

It is with deep regret that The Guardian records the death of Mr. Hibbert M. Downing, of Summerside, which occurred about 10:30 on Saturday night in the Prince County Hospital where he was operated on for appendicitis about three weeks ago. He rallied from the operation but complications set in, which proved too much for his weakened condition.

The late Mr. Downing was a man of pleasing personality and his cheery greeting will be missed by his many friends. He was born in River John, Pictou County, N. S., and was the son of the late Rev. J. D. Downing, Rector of St. John's Church at River John, who was of United Empire Loyalist extraction.

Mr. Downing spent his boyhood days there and when he reached man's estate, chose as his profession, civil engineering. He joined the staff of the Federal Department of Railways and Canals and followed his profession as a railway engineer with that department for six years. He was two years in northern Ontario. He also had much experience with marine engineering.

At the time of the Halifax explosion, Mr. Downing had several contracts in connection with the rebuilding of the Halifax terminals and Richmond Station. On account of his skill as an engineer and his wide experience, he was entrusted with the work of building the artificial harbour and railway terminals at Borden, which will be a monument to his memory. He also built many of the residences in Borden. Besides many buildings in Charlottetown and Summerside, many of the highways in this Province, including the Borden to Summerside highway, were built under his supervision.

Mr. Downing was a staunch Conservative and during political campaigns worked loyally for his party. Last August, he was nominated as the Conservative candidate in the bye-election for the Fifth District of Prince and was defeated by his opponent, Dr. John F. McNeill, of Summerside by one vote on October 12.

Mr. Downing always supported every advancement for higher education and was one of the principal agents in obtaining the new secondary school for Summerside. He advocated many schemes for the benefit of the working class. He was a member of St. Mary's Anglican Church and a warden for many years. He supported all the social activities of the church.

St. Mary's hall was designed and built by Mr. Downing a few years ago. The deceased took a keen interest in sport and was President of the Crystal Hockey Club at one time. He was also President of the Gentlemen's Club.

In 1919 he married Miss Elizabeth Bell, daughter of the late William Bell and Mrs. Bell, of Carleton, and niece of the late Hon. John H. Bell, former Premier of the Province. A kind and affectionate husband and father he will be sorely missed in the home where he was loved and honored.

Much sympathy goes out to Mrs. Downing and her three small children, John, Douglas and Miss Diana. Mrs. Downing is seriously ill at the present time, due to the strain of the past three weeks.

There are also left to mourn, one brother, James, in Montreal and three sisters, Mrs. Forbes in Tatamagouche, N. S., Mrs. McDonald, of Calgary and Mrs. Phillimore, of Montreal.

The funeral will take place on Tuesday from St. Mary's Church at 1 p. m.

STREAM FLOW IN BRITISH COLUMBIA OTTAWA, Dec. 12—The Dominion Water Power and Hydrometric Bureau of the Department of the Interior reports that the run-off in British Columbia during October was somewhat below normal throughout the province, particularly in the Coastal region where it was only about one half of the October average. In the Central Fraser River area the run-off was 81 per cent of normal, in the North Thompson River area it was 84 per cent of normal, and in the Upper Kootenay River basin it was 76 per cent of the normal for the month of October.

On Solo Voyage In Small Craft (Canadian Press) LONDON, Dec. 10.—Rev. John Antle, padre to the lumber men and Indians on the coast of British Columbia, who has come to England to take over a new ship for his mission, a 65 foot Diesel-engined boat, intends to take the little craft back himself. He is a certificated skipper. "The trip across the Atlantic, through Panama and up the British Columbia coast to Vancouver Island is about 18,000 miles," Mr. Antle told an interviewer here. "After I have been round England showing a cinematograph film of the mission work, which I have made myself, I hope to sail in May, he added.

The Columbia Coast Mission, which "skipper" Antle founded 26 years ago, and of which he is superintendent has already three ships, the most important of which, the Columbia, is an up to date hospital ship, equipped with wireless. She spends much of her time answering S.O.S.'s and carrying serious cases to the three mission hospitals.
