A PIG WHICH WOULDN'T INVADE. The annals of the state of Kentucky set forth an old incident in connection with the invasion of Canada by the Kentucky troops in 1812.

TO CLEAN RIBBON.

It is not a difficult matter to cleanse ribbons of the soiled spots by means of gasoline, though you cannot get them to look exactly like new, of course. Gasoline does not take out the stiffness, nor does it fade them. It acts exactly like a dry cleanser.

The only precaution in the use of this fluid is to be careful and take it into the open air, where there is no danger from contact with fire or heat, as it is inflammable. After washing the ribbons in the liquid, the same as if it were water, squeeze out all the fluid that is possible with the hands and then hang in the air until all trace of odor disappears.

Another way of cleaning them is to make sponges of white soap and warm water and fill a bottle with it. Shake the ribbons around in this until they are clean; rinse and hang up to dry. Press on the wrong side when the ribbons are nearly dry. If you press while they are wet they will become stiff and shiny.

CHAMPION WRESTLER.

Nedeff the Syrian is now in Charlottetown.

Here is a chance for some Charlottetown athletes to earn a dollar a minute. Wednesday night George Nedeff, the Champion Syrian wrestler and strong boy arrived in the city and today he is publishing a proposition to wrestle at catch-can and five local men, paying a dollar a minute to every man who stays with him, one hour being the limit.

Nedeff is twenty-two years of age, and is a native of Damascus, Syria. He came to the United States about five years ago, and during that time he has been engaged in one hundred and fifty wrestling matches in that country and in Canada, and claims to have lost only two of them. Eugene Trembley, the French, Canadian Welter-weight champion of the world took one hour and fifty-five minutes and eleven seconds to throw the Assyrian. Daniel McDonald, the Maritime heavy-weight, attempted to throw him three times within the hour and only got George on the mat once.

Nedeff weighs, when stripped, 140 pounds, is five feet four inches high, and measures forty-two inches around the chest, sixteen inches around the biceps, wears a seventeen inch collar, and has a chest expansion of nine inches. He is single, a teetotaler, and abstains from tobacco in every form. He was born strong and has developed his wonderful muscular system by gymnasium work. He keeps himself strong with simple food, plenty of sleep, no worry and no bad habits.

Since arriving on this side of the water George has mastered the English language. He also speaks three other languages and has a fine stage appearance. He is a boxer of considerable skill and has a very thrilling act in which he breaks chains with his hands and across his chest, tears packs of cards apart with his fists, drives with his fist, a big spike through a table or chair, and draws it out with his teeth, lifts two boys seated on a chair or a table, and gives other marvellous exhibitions of his extraordinary strength.

His last match was in Monlton on September 28th, when he won a decision over John Kilonis, the Greek middle weight champion of the United States. As soon as arrangements are completed Mr Nedeff will give an exhibition here, both in wrestling and in the strong man act.
