 PASADENA, Cal., Feb. 2.—A positive cure for diabetes through elimination of impurities in so-called pure insulin is being sought here by Dr. J. H. Abel, professor of pharmacology and physiological chemistry of Johns Hopkins University.

For some time physicians and scientists have been administering insulin believing it to be pure, said Dr. Abel. Recently he found that even the purest contained foreign materials. He then obtained a sample of absence and came here to continue his search for means of eliminating these impurities. The Canadian Vimy Memorial Church

This bronze tablet (or "A Bronze Tablet") designed and manufactured by Henry Birks & Sons, is now exhibited in the show-window of this firm in Montreal. In a few days it will be on its way to France, to be erected inside the "Canadian Vimy Memorial Church" in Lens (Pas-de-Calais). The inauguration of the Church is planned to take place on the first of October, when a delegation from the Committee in Canada, as well as Canadian military and civilian officials will represent the many thousands of citizens who have contributed to this memorial, and solemnly hand the completed building to the Federation of Protestant Churches in France.

Immediately after the Armistice men of all creeds realized to what an extent France had suffered not only in the loss of its manhood and in its material wealth, but in the ruin of its religious and historical sanctuaries. Noble cathedrals like Rheims, Arras and Soissons, historical landmarks like Calvin's birthplace in Noyon, city churches like the Collegiate shrines of Catholic and Protestant, had been either hopelessly damaged or absolutely annihilated. Also when an appeal came from France to the Protestants of Canada for help in rebuilding the nearest Huguenot Church to the famous Vimy Ridge, it seemed to answer providentially the wish in many hearts to erect a memorial to the blood of our soldiers in a memorial to their sacrifice.

The suggestion arrived from France, through Professor and Madame Charles Bieler, was endorsed by Canada's foremost spiritual leaders was passed on from coast to coast and was everywhere enthusiastically received. In May, 1920 it was decided that the headquarters of the movement would be in Montreal and a Committee composed of Anglicans, Baptists, Congregationalists, Methodists and Presbyterians was formed with the following executive: Honorary President: Major General Sir John Carson, C. B., Chairman: Rev. Canon Shattford, D. C. L., O. B. E., Honorary Treasurer: Brig. General J.G. Ross, C. M. C., Hon. Secretary, Rev. Professor Charles Bieler, D.D., Assessors: Lansing Lewis Esq., D. C. L., A.M.C.A., Murphy Esq., Rev. M. F. McCutcheon, S. T. M., Rev. A. E. Rummels, B. D.

On the 14th of November 1920 an offering was taken in a great number of churches all through the country and it was decided to erect on the property in Lens a Church to cost 300,000 francs. However, the building was delayed for several years on account of unforeseen difficulties. Not only was the soil unsettled by the underlying gas pits having been flooded, but a mine of dynamite was found under the former foundations. Then the government survey and valuations for "war damages" had to be waited for, and lastly the difficulty of obtaining building material and labor in an area when more than seven hundred thousand houses needed rebuilding further delayed the proceedings. At last, however, every difficulty was surmounted; now the finishing touches are being put to the building in view of its inauguration on Whit Monday.

Any persons or churches wishing other to make a final contribution towards the furniture of the Church or to give some distinctive article in memory of a soldier relative are invited to correspond with the Treasurer or the Secretary of the Committee. The following suggestions for such contributions have been made: hymn-board, announcement-board, Bible desk for communion table, hymn books, harmonium or any other Church furnishings, consistent with the form of worship of the Reformed Church of France.

We may add that the minister of the Protestant church in Lens is Mr. J. B. Couve, who speaks English fluently, and will be glad to welcome any Canadian visitors to his Church and to his manse.

Menimise The Evil

(W. L. Cotton.)

Granted that the Scott Act and the Provincial Prohibitory Liquor law were both continuously evaded and never rigidly enforced, it is nevertheless evident that the great public evil resulting from the liquor traffic has been considerably reduced since those laws were enacted.

In the year 1877, shortly before the Scott Act was introduced there were 729 convictions for drunkenness in this city of Charlottetown—an average of two each day of the year, including Sunday; last year the number of convictions for drunkenness in this city was 63. In the 1893, several years before the Provincial Prohibitory Act was passed it was reported by The Examiner published on the 16th of December that "within a few weeks there were two men drowned, one boy found dead in Victoria Park, one man almost frozen to death and one man almost a murderer as a result of drunkenness in this Province."

At the last session of the Supreme Court in Prince County last year there were no criminal cases and the presiding Judge was presented with a pair of gloves. At the first session of the Supreme Court in Queens County this year no criminal cases were tried. A like creditable and satisfactory condition was evident at some sessions of the Supreme Court in Kings County in town and country alike, poverty is not so prevalent today as it was fifty years ago, because the liquor traffic has been considerably lessened. A clerk in our banks or stores known to be addicted to liquor is not now tolerated. Certainly there has been in recent years a great abatement of the liquor evil.

The abatement evident is not a result of the application of moral suasion. Our clergymen have not engaged to any great extent in denunciations of the sin of drunkenness. Temperance organizations have not lately fulminated strongly against that which at the last "biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." In this city the only active temperance associations are the League of the Cross in connection with St. Dunstan's Cathedral and the Band of Hope in connection with St. Peters Church. The evident improvement in country and in town as to the evil of intemperance may therefore be ascribed chiefly to the Prohibitory Liquor Law.

That the evil has not yet been minimized to the extent that it ought to be was evident in a recent notable fatality resulting from it. No doubt there are yet some sudden deaths and still some poverty caused by the excessive use of intoxicants. What then is the lesson of experience? If moral suasion were applied together with the law, the improvement would, it is reasonable to conclude be more apparent and more satisfactory. But the results apart, from moral suasion, justify the hope that a further diminution of the evil would follow a more general and a more rigid enforcement of the law. Imperfect as it is, over-inquisitive as it may be in some respects, it is yet the most effective law for the lessening of the liquor evil that we have ever possessed. There can be no doubt upon that point. Every liquor law previously enacted was disregarded, broken just as the liquor laws of Quebec, British Columbia and other Provinces throughout Canada—and the liquor evil still increased. But as a result of the passage and operation of Prohibitory Liquor laws in this Province, a decided, diminution of the liquor evil is this Province. We do not of course, obtain so much revenue from it, as we should if it were under the control of the Government. But in our case all (or nearly all) the revenue obtained from the traffic must come out of the pockets of the people of the Province in respect to Quebec and other border Provinces, persons who are more thrifty and thoughtful persons come over from the United States and leave their money behind them to their loss. But in respect to Prince Edward Island, the additional revenue of the Province must—if "Government Control were in operation—be paid by the men living in the Province whose appetites for alcoholic stimulants have been already established or who thoughtlessly and foolishly indulge in the beverage which creates the appetite, the appetite which causes the dreadful public evil consequent upon the liquor traffic. If the Government of this Province were in receipt of largely increased revenues because of its more rigid enforcement of the liquor traffic the people of this Province would certainly be so much the poorer, while the evils resulting from the enlarged traffic would be so much the greater. No patriotic person—man or woman—however personally temperate, would rejoice in the little relief from taxation that would result from such a change in our liquor law.

Therefore the Prohibitory Liquor Law, the enactment of which has already resulted in a considerable diminution of the liquor evil, should be maintained, and more generally and rigidly enforced in the future than in the past. Everyone who thinks everyone who complains that the liquor evil has not been reduced to the extent that it may be, should bring pressure to bear upon those officials whose duty it is to prosecute and enforce the law. Public officials are amenable to Public Opinion. The prohibition commissioners, the prosecuting attorneys, the police, the magistrates, the judges—all whose duty it is to administer the law—will be enabled to do their duty more effectively if they are supported by the people.

 The program began with the following address:
 To Artemas Moffatt,

 As one traverses along life's pathway, and perchance at any milestone on that journey turns to glance back for a moment over the miles that have been covered, the scenes that rise up before the mind are not visions of what one himself or herself has accomplished but of the influence that other lives have left on one's own. As we tonight have come to the close of another year of our earthly pilgrimage and are about to cross the threshold that marks the beginning of another span of life, our minds cannot but reflect on the past through which we have come. And in those reminiscences there is one man in our community and in our church life that we desire to place in the very front rank of our leaders a character which in our estimation stands second to none. It is with that desire uppermost in our minds that we have assembled here in your own home tonight to express, in so far as we are able, our thankfulness and our appreciation for the place occupied in the past and at present by you our brother Artemas Moffatt.
