CONSERVATIVE IS ELECTED

FORMER SPEAKER BEATEN IN MOOSE JAW COUNTY.

REGINA, Dec. 12.—Reports received here show the election of a Conservative in the Provincial bye-election in Moose Jaw County, Sask. The former Speaker of the Legislature, Hon. J. A. Sheppard, was named in the findings of the Commission investigating the connection between the Scott Government and the liquor interests. Sheppard resigned and was a candidate for re-election. In 1912 he won by 351, and now has been defeated by 50 majority.

The French and Austrian vote went solidly for the Liberal candidate. There will probably be arrests following the election, as twenty-two of the ballot boxes have been in possession of the Liberal candidate since the election. The Conservative majority of fifty could easily be wiped out by the change of a few votes in each poll. This is the first contested bye-election under the new Liberal Administration headed by Premier Martin. It is estimated that the Conservative candidate polled eighty-five per cent of the English-speaking vote. The Conservative candidate and member for Moose Jaw County is John Chisholm, barrister of Moose Jaw. Mr. Chisholm is a Nova Scotian who has been in Moose Jaw for ten years.
