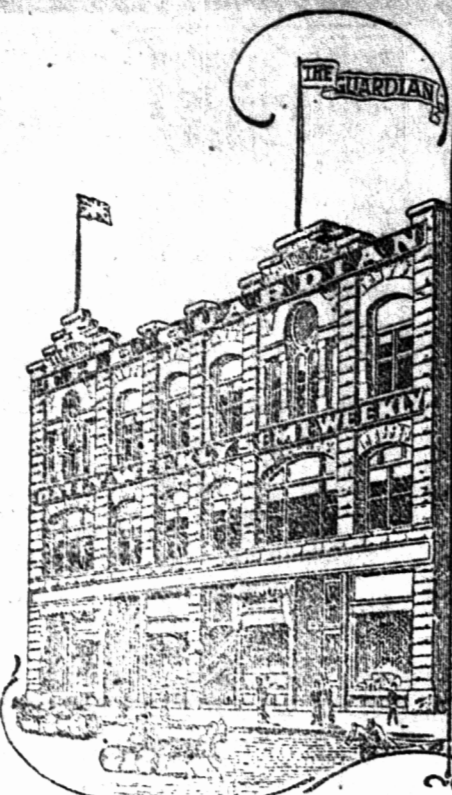

**IF THE PRESIDENT HAD BEEN KILLED.**

The death of President McKinley by assassination and the awfully narrow escape of his successor the other day has set the newspapers across the line to speculating upon what would have been the course of events had President Roosevelt been killed. As is well-known, if the President dies during his term of office the Vice-President succeeds him, as happened when Mr. McKinley was killed. But had Mr. Roosevelt been killed in the accident of the other day there would have been no Vice-President to succeed him. This would have been a very awkward situation if there had been no other provision than that of the original Constitution, but fortunately an Act of the 49th Congress had provided for this unlooked-for emergency.

The original provision was that the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the President and Vice-President, declaring what officer shall then act as President, and such officer shall act accordingly, until the disability be removed or a President shall be elected. But by the Act of Congress above referred to the Secretary of State shall in

such case act as President until the disability of the President or Vice President is removed or a President is elected. If there be no Secretary of State then the Secretary of the Treasury will act; and the remainder of the order of succession is Secretary of War, Attorney General, Postmaster General, Secretary of the Navy, and Secretary of the Interior. The acting President must upon taking office at once convene Congress, if not in session at the time giving twenty days notice.

It may be of interest to Guardian readers to specify here the members of the Cabinet who stand in the order of succession to the Presidency as above specified. They are:

- Hon. John Hay, Ohio, Sec. of State.
- Hon. Lyman J. Gage, Illinois, Sec. of Treasury.
- Hon. Elihu Root, New York, Sec. of War.
- Hon. P. C. Knox, Penn., Attorney General.
- Hon. H. C. Payne, Wisconsin, P. M. General.
- Hon. J. D. Long, Mass., Sec. of Navy.
- Hon. E. A. Hitchcock, Mo., Sec. of Interior.

Here are seven gentlemen, not one of whom has been elected by the people to the position which he now holds, any one of whom might under certain possible but improbable conditions become President of the United States. But as they were all appointed by the President there is at least a guarantee that they are of the same political party as the President whom they might be called to succeed. Canadians will join heartily with their American cousins in thankfulness that the emergency has not arisen which would bring the "order of succession" into active force, the more so as Secretary Hay upon whom the honor and burden would have first fallen is reported to be in a weak state of health.

**THE MONROE DOCTRINE.**

Possibly sooner than was expected Uncle Sam may have a test of the validity of the Monroe Doctrine. Our uncle has for some time had his eye upon the large West India Island of Hayti, which is next to Cuba the largest of the West India group, and lies directly between Cuba and Porto Rico. Quite recently a Washington despatch intimated that owing to the disturbed conditions in Hayti the President and Cabinet were considering the propriety of intervention to protect American interests. Yesterday's despatches told that Germany has already taken a hand in the game and has sent to the bottom a Haytian revolutionary gunboat. Now we shall see what we shall see. The ship has apparently been knocked off of Uncle Sam's shoulder, and by a cannon shot at that. The Kaiser and War Lord of Germany who has little love for the Monroe Doctrine, must surely be called upon to explain.

The Gulf of Mexico is, take it all in all a very disturbed piece of water. To say nothing of hurricanes and tornadoes, volcanoes and earthquakes, it has been within the past few years been plowed by various filibustering fleets, and shaken by the thunder of the fleets of the United States and Spain, the latter being doomed to plow the seas no more, owing to their want of speed in the memorable race at Santiago. It is therefore very rude of the Kaiser to begin a new racket in that quarter, the more so as Pelee and the Souffriere are still enterprising. If William would take The Guardian's advice he would seek some other field for the exercise of his gun-boats just now. He may fool around the Haytian and Venetian coasts till he suddenly gets into serious trouble.

A few days ago The Patriot announced with a great flourish of trumpets a new enterprise which the Local Government and others were promoting, which it was claimed would be the greatest possible boon to the Island. People were naturally interested in a scheme which promised so great benefits and wanted to learn more about it, but The Patriot at once lapsed into silence which it still maintains. It will neither give information of itself nor answer questions. It would be interesting to learn the cause of this reticence.

Canada is coming to the front as a wheat-grower. Her crop this year will considerably exceed 100,000,000 bushels, as against an estimated yield of 645,000,000 in the United States. As the Republic has about fifteen times as much population as Canada we have something like two and a half times as much wheat per head as our neighbors. The home consumption in the United States is increasing much more rapidly than the production of wheat thus bringing within measurable distance the time when the Republic will cease to be a wheat-exporting country.

Says the Christian Guardian of Toronto: "There are some who still seem to doubt that a prohibitory law could be made effective in our Province. To such the experiments already made should prove instructive. In the United States the following five States are entirely prohibitory: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Kansas and North Dakota. Five other States are very largely prohibitive territory: Georgia, South Dakota, South Carolina, Iowa and Delaware. Then there are about four thousand cities and towns, one thousand counties, and a large number of smaller divisions in which some measure of local option that aims at the annihilation of the traffic prevails. From time to time it happens that a repeal of the prohibitory law is secured, but it remains year after year in the vast majority of instances, and the number of "dry" districts is rapidly on the increase. In law-abiding districts where a prohibitory law has been anyway fairly tried, and the will of the people is allowed free expression, the verdict is that a prohibition law is worth maintaining."

It may not be generally known, although it is a fact that wheat is harvested in some part of the world in every month of the year. January is harvest time for wheat in Australia, New Zealand, Chili and Argentina. In February and March comes the harvest of Upper Egypt and India. In April Lower Egypt, parts of India, Syria, Cyprus, Persia, Asia Minor, Mexico and Cuba; in May Texas, Algeria, Central Asia, China, Japan and Morocco; in June California and the Southern States, Turkey, Greece, Italy, Spain and the South of France; in July New England, the Middle and Western States, South of Russia, Bulgaria, Austria, Hungary, Ontario and the South of England. In August the North western States, Quebec, Britain, Belgium, Denmark, Poland and Central Russia; in September and October Scotland, Sweden, Norway and North of Russia; in November Peru and South Africa and in December Burma and New South Wales.
