ST JOHN WANTS MANUAL TRAINING

And School Board Asks Twenty Thousand Dollars to Introduce it—Compulsory Attendance, Consolidation, Abolition of Third Class Salary Asked for.

St. JOHN, Feb. 12.—(Special.)—Interest is also sent to the Government a petition asking for the compulsory attendance of children; the abolition of third-class licenses; that each parish be considered one school district, with power to consolidate the present subdivisions, and that a general increase of ten per cent in salaries be made.

ARMED RESISTANCE NATAL POLL TAX

PIETERMARITZBURG, Natal, Feb. 10.—Armed natives have resisted the collection of the poll tax near Richmond and it is feared the trouble will develop into a native uprising. An inspector of police and a trooper were wounded and 14 mounted police who were proceeding to the scene were attacked and six are missing. Troops and police are concentrated.

WANT MAYOR AND OTHERS TO QUIT

FORT WILLIAM, Feb. 10.—A mass meeting of citizens to discuss the fever outbreak has asked the mayor and other officials to resign. The cause of the epidemic is said to be that a portion of the intake pipe was carried away by steamers' anchors last fall. Above the intake pipe is a sewer and with the broken pipe sewerage has got into the drinking water. The officials are blamed for neglect in not attending to the matter at once.

SENT CAR LOAD OF EXHIBITS

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—The Canadian government has forwarded a car of exhibits via the port of St. John to Europe. Some of the shipment is destined for London, where it will be displayed in the Imperial Institute among the representative products of Canada, which form a permanent exhibit there. The rest of the goods will be delivered in Milan, Italy, where the Canadian government purposes making an exhibit in connection with the coming international exposition in that city.

A DOGSLED TRIP OF MANY MILES

St. JOHN'S N. F., Feb. 10.—Letters received here from Dillon Wallace, an explorer, who penetrated the interior of Labrador, in a northwesterly direction and arrived at Fort Chimo, the Hudson's Bay Company's station on Ungava Bay, announce that he intends to return to civilization by making a three-thousand-mile journey on dogsleds, traversing the coast of Hudson Strait to Cape Chudleigh, then southerly along the Atlantic face of Labrador and westward along Belle Isle Strait and the narrower areas of the Gulf of St. Lawrence up the river to Quebec. It is a longer journey than has ever yet been attempted by a single man in these northeastern wilds.

WHALERS WILL HAVE HARD TIME

EDMONTON, Feb. 10.—Corporal Munro has arrived down from Lesser Slave Lake, accompanied by Mr. Desjardins, who is fur trading there. Corporal Munro spent the last two years and a half at Hirschel Island, at the mouth of the MacKenzie River, and is familiar with the conditions confronting the whalers who are frozen in at Point Barrow this winter and for whose safety a great deal of uneasiness is felt. Corporal Munro left Hirschel Island in July for Edmonton, and consequently is not posted as to their present situation, but he says that there were four ships which wintered in the north last winter, the Bowhead, and Karluk at Hirschel Island, and the Herman and Bonanza at Point Barrow. Besides these there were eight other ships which came in last summer while he was there and which intended to get out last fall, but of which only two managed to reach the Pacific.
