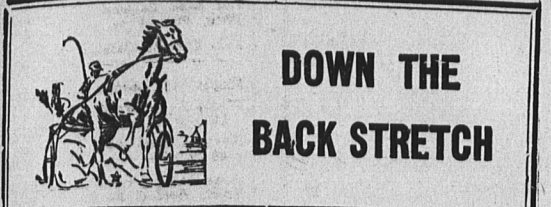

At the annual meeting of the United States Trotting Association held in Detroit, Monday, March 10th, Roger Duncan, Hartford, Conn., was elected Executive Vice-President and Secretary of the Association...

The National A. A. W. horse show pitching tournament will be held at Columbus, Ohio, for the first time in its history. Several different events will be represented. The tournament will be in connection with the State Fair at North Randall and there will be a special feature contest between Governor Bricker of Ohio, and Governor James of Pennsylvania...

The most important winter sale of 1941 was completed at Orlando, Florida, a few days ago when Vic Fleming purchased the four-year-old pacing gelding Edgar Hanover from E. Roland Harriman and Elbridge Gerry. The price paid was around \$4,000 and the colt will be raced in the Grand Circuit stakes...

The best mile of the season at Orlando, Florida was by the two-year-old pacer Volo Britton—2:22 1-4. The best mile for a two-year-old trotter was stepped by Frank Spencer, son of Spencer, 1:59 1-2, out of Jane Revere (2) 2:06 3-4, time 2:26. The two-year-old pacer Charlie Babcock made the last quarter of a mile in 31 1-2 seconds for Ben White. He is sired by Guy Abbey.

Harness horse papers continue to feature the ice races at Charlottetown and considerable credit for this is due to Dr. J. M. Nicholson, local correspondent. In recent issues of The Harness Horse, The Horseman and Fair World and other publications, there is full accounts of doings here. Dr. Nicholson has had a very congratulatory letter recently from Walter Moore, noted harness horse writer. Walter mentioned his interest in Millie Kalmuck and her sire, Kalmuck 2:15 1-2, who is highly regarded by him.

The sensational pacer Doctor Baker (4) 2:02 1-4, owned by A. F. Simonson of Grand Forks, N. D., will be raced on the Grand Circuit this season by Sep Palm, who drove Greyhound 1:55 1-4 to his various world records. Doctor Baker won 16 firsts and 2 second moneys last season and his campaign was one of the greatest in racing history. With the exceptions he raced over half-mile rings and five of his miles on the minor ovals were below 2:05, one of them in 2:03 1-4, two in 2:03 1-2, one in 2:04 1-2 and five different states and one province in Canada—Manitoba—where he paced a mile in 2:03 1-2 over the Brandon track. As a five-year-old he will be stronger and more mature. There should take a record well below two minutes when he becomes accustomed to the mile rings.

Quilty Of Canadiens Wins Rookie Award

By Robert Clarke Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO, March 21—(CP)—The story-book rise to stardom of Johnny Quilty—one of those favored with the fabled luck of the Irish—took on a further fictional tinge today as the young centre star of Montreal Canadiens was named the outstanding rookie of the National Hockey League season. Hockey writers around the N.H.L. circuit, balking at the annual poll for the Calder Trophy conducted by The Canadian Press, chose Quilty as top freshman by a narrow margin over Gailie Johnny Mowers of Detroit Red Wings. No other first-year man came close to these two in the voting.

Fifteen of the 30 writers who were asked to name their first, second and third choices, named Quilty as the No. 1 rookie while 14 picked him for second place, leaving only one writer who failed to consider him at all. Mowers received 14 first-place votes, 11 seconds and 11 thirds.

Hugh C. Stewart, New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, owner of Hal Britton, 2:09 3/4, has purchased a good pacer, Bing Crosby, 2:07 1/2. This horse has raced three seasons and has made 42 starts in that period. He took his record of 2:07 1/2 in 1939 and is eligible to the 2:15 pace. A cur ory look over the year book shows Bing a potent factor in most of his contests. He should be a good horse for his class in the Maritimes.

Royals are Quebec champs

MONTREAL, March 21—(CP)—Montreal Royals unleashed a smashing attack for a 6-4 victory over St. Jerome Papermakers here tonight in a game that swept the Papermakers out of the provincial hockey playoffs and gave the Royals the right to represent Quebec in Allan Cup competition for the third successive year.

The win gave Royals, provincial senior champions, the best-of-five series three games to one over the Quebec intermediate champions. They now meet Toronto Marlboros or South Porcupine Bisons in an Eastern semi-final best-of-five series that opens here Monday night. Papermakers, who upset all the predictions by taking the second game of a series that had been all but conceded to Royals in straight games, were never in the picture tonight. Royals rattled in three goals in the first 11 minutes of play and were never seriously threatened after that.

Blanchard put St. Jerome temporarily back in the fight late in the first period, but Royals had run the count to 4-1 before the session ended. They outscored their intermediate opponents by the same margin in the second, then stayed off a last-period St. Jerome rally. Bisons beat Marlboros

MAPLE LEAF GARDENS, TORONTO, March 21—(CP)—The amazing South Porcupine Bisons, the darkest of the dark horses along the Allan Cup trail, scored a spectacular 2-1 overtime victory tonight over Toronto Marlboros to deadlock their best-of-three game Ontario senior amateur hockey championship series at a game piece.

The Bisons, who had to argue their way into a chance at entering the field for the Allan Cup, clinched an uphill fight that saw them swing the sympathy of the crowd their way when Hugh Allan rifled a high shot past goalie Baz Bastien of Marlboros at the half-way mark of the extra session.

Stops Surprising Abe Simon After Thirteen Rounds Of Gruelling, Tough Battle

By SID FEDER Associated Press Sports Writer DETROIT, March 21—(AP)—Joe Louis successfully defended his world heavyweight championship for the 15th time tonight by stopping Abe Simon, of New York, in 13 rounds before an estimated crowd of 19,000 in the Olympia. Louis weighed 202, Simon 254 1/2.

After fighting blow for blow with Louis for 12 rounds, Simon ran into the Bomber's big guns in the 13th and was floored twice with right hands. He got up the second time, but staggered blindly into the ropes, as Joe chased him with more blows, and Referee Sam Hennessy stopped the bout at one minute, 20 seconds of the round.

Simon was floored twice before the 13th round. He was down for no count in the first and for nine in the third. Altogether it was one of the most surprising showings in any Louis bout up to now for Simon wasn't expected to go more than three rounds, yet he not only lasted 12 full heats, but was fighting all the way to the finish with a great show of courage and a fine left hand.

DETROIT, March 21—(AP)—Promoter Mike Jacobs announced tonight that he had stopped Abe Simon in 13 rounds at Olympia, that the two would be re-matched in a 15-round heavyweight title fight in Madison Square Garden, New York, on May 16.

The Fight By Rounds

ROUND ONE
Louis hooked a left to the ear. Louis jabbed another to the cheek and corner. Joe was start with two jabs. Abe bounced a crook off Louis' eye. Louis floored Simon with a whipling right but Abe was up with no count. Abe jabbed Joe twice on the nose and once on the left side of the body. They maulled each other in close. Joe bounced a left and right off Abe's chin and Abe was staggered. In a half clinch Joe crossed to the head and took left to the body from the giant. Louis smashed right and left to the head. They stood in mid-ring a few moments swinging wildly. Abe backed Louis into the ropes at the bell and the crowd roared.

ROUND TWO
Simon dug three lefts into the body as he backed Joe into a neutral corner. Joe ripped a left to the mid-section. Abe's left jab snapped Joe's head back. Simon threw left and right to the body. Simon flicked twice with a left jab. Joe raised a red mark on nose's eye. They traded straight lefts to the head. Abe jabbed three times to the face without a return. Louis smashed two solid rights to Abe's jaw. Again the square of the giant exchanged long lefts. Louis hooked a hard left to the head at the bell. Simon's round.

ROUND THREE
Between rounds it was noted Simon was a slight cut over the left eye. Louis was doing a better job of picking off Abe's left in this round. They traded jabs with little action. Joe bounced a left off Abe's nose and took two in return. Joe bounced right and left off Abe's face. A right hand floored Abe near a neutral corner and he took a nine count. Joe rushed in throwing lefts to the chin and the giant took it standing up at the bell. Louis' round.

ROUND FOUR
Louis hooked a left to the nose and took a jab high on the head in return. Joe stuck his left three times to the face. Simon landed a sizzling hook on the ear and then dug his left into Abe's ample body. Louis was stalking Abe in this round on the hook two in return. They traded straight lefts in mid-ring. Abe hooked Joe's nose and made Joe blink. They fired lefts at the body. In a half clinch Louis hooked to the chin and Abe threw a left to the body. Abe threw two jabs at Joe's nose. Joe's right connected with Abe's ear. Joe bounced a right off Abe's chin at the bell. Louis' round.

ROUND FIVE
Again they spent several seconds trading jabs. Joe fired two rights and a left to the head. Louis whistled a right off Abe's ear. In a half clinch Joe's left and right connected to the face. Louis bounced another right off the jaw and Abe went into a clinch. Louis fired a swinging left and right and then caught Abe on the nose with a hard straight left. Abe threw a left to the ear. Joe fired two hard lefts to the head but Simon hooked right back at him. Louis smashed Abe full on the mouth with a hard right. Abe flicked three times with his left at the bell. Louis' round.

ROUND SIX
Abe struck that same straight left into Joe's face twice. For half a minute the only action was three crook jabs that grazed Joe's nose. Louis hooked a hard left to the jaw. Joe fired a smashing left to the body and a right to the head. Abe threw a left and right off Abe's ear. Joe slipped in Abe's corner as Simon dug a right into the body. Joe banged a right high on the head. Abe
