There are two types of plates that are made by the photoengraving process. One is termed a line plate. This is made up entirely of black masses or lines, there being little or no shading. It is the easiest kind of a plate to print from. Rather rough paper can be used and very little time is required for what is termed "make ready"; that is to say, getting the plate adjusted in the printing press so that it will give the correct impression to the paper.

The other plate in common use is the halftone. A much wider variety of effects is possible with the halftone. The halftone is made by photographing the drawing to be reproduced through what is termed a screen. This photograph image is made, upon sensitised metal and after photographing it is immersed in an acid bath which eats away the portions which are not to be printed and only leaves the part from which an impression is desired. This screen through which the photographing is done to the casual eye might look like an ordinary fly screen but it really is a sheet of glass upon which very fine perpendicular and horizontal lines have been drawn of equal space. There are spaces in the plate which it is desired to make. They are as fine as two hundred lines to the inch and as coarse sometimes as fifty lines to the inch. What is called the fine screen

gives better contrasts, a softer effect, and is in every respect the most desirable kind of plate. But unfortunately it can be printed upon a very highly surfaced paper. A very fine screen halftone for example could not be printed upon the paper which is used for your newspaper. There are doubtless many halftones in the issue which you are reading now, but they are all what is called coarse screen halftones which range from sixty-five lines to the inch to perhaps a hundred lines to the inch. If you put a magnifying glass on a halftone illustration you

will see that it is broken up by innumerable dots which are formed by the intersection of these lines through which the original picture has been photographed.

Lithography is another method of printing illustrations but in this method the picture is transferred to stone by a chemical process and printed from this stone just as though the stone were a plate. Lithography is better adapted to the printing of large editions of posters, circulars and other literature of that sort.
