Marketing Wheat Crop A Problem

(Special to the Guardian)
WITH THE UNPRECEDENTED 1928 wheat crop, it is admitted, will be a problem. Opponents of the pool think it will be a test, and a severe one, of the pool program. They point out that this organization has operated heretofore under relatively favorable conditions and is now confronted with a falling market. The pool officials, convinced that their idea is right are not worrying. The high grading which this year's crop promises will be a favorable factor as Canadian wheat is sought for its quality. The lowered price may result in increased demand in countries where consumption of quality flour is limited by buying capacity.

The fact remains that the world is well supplied with wheat. The manager Ramsay of the grain pool estimates that the production this year will exceed that of 1927 by 120,000,000 bushels. This is a big item considering that total exports from wheat growing countries are a little more than 700,000,000 bushels in the fiscal year ending March 31 last. According to the official trade figures from Ottawa Canada exported 296,902,189 bushels. Can this be materially increased?

WILL MARS AGAIN APPEAR CHANGED?

Plan et Approaches Earth in December and Great Interest is Shown in Possibility of Further Movement of Canals and "Lake of Sun."

LONDON, Aug. 28.—Mars is again approaching the earth, and Man, who is ever on the Martian's track, is getting excited over prospects of the red planet winning from the ruddy planet one of its most profound secrets—the existence of intelligent beings.

Two years ago, when Mars was in a very favorable position, changes were noticed, compared with the observation of 1924. The large area of Vegetation known as the "Lake of the Sun" had completely altered its shape and shifted several hundred miles northward. The "canals" had also changed their configuration.

Was it due to Martian agriculture on a colossal scale or was it the result of a catastrophe of nature? asks the Daily News. The extraordinary fact remains, however, that the "canals" as seen in 1926 had reverted to their appearance in drawing made half a century ago.

In December, when the planet will be at its nearest again, scientists hope to solve many riddles and to gain some clue whether rational intelligence lies behind the movements of "The Lake of the Sun" and the "canals."

Dr. R. L. Waterfield, the NEWS' astronomical correspondent, writes that the approach of 1928 was probably the most remarkable since and early nights when Schiaparelli made his discoveries of the Martian "canals." For two years ago things happened on Mars that never happened before. Certain prominent features of the planet's surface had undergone an entire transformation since the previous apparition. Of these the most remarkable was the case of that large, dark oval marking, the so-called "Lake of the Sun."

This is a large area of vegetation covering several hundred thousand square miles; not only had it completely altered its shape since 1924, but it had been shifted bodily northwards several hundred miles, a distance greater than its own diameter. More over the system of "canals" leading in and out of it, had taken a quite new configuration.

"Such a phenomenon is entirely unexplained," says Dr. Waterfield. "Was it an earthquake or some stupendous hurricane or tempest that rought the change?—for one has to remember that there are no large oceans on the planet into which or out of which countries can sink or rise. One tentative suggestion was that this was yet another manifestation of the existence of intelligent beings that might have been witnessed the following year."

"But there were other remarkable changes on the planet; thus in the "Greater Syrtis" the configuration of the "canals" and the dark markings had reverted to the form which they exhibited in the drawing of Schiaparelli half a century ago.

"And this is why this coming of the planet is going to be so exciting. Will the "Lake of the Sun" have moved back to its position previous to 1924, will it have remained the same, or will the changes have progressed further in the same direction?"

"Moreover, are we going to find changes of the same nature in other parts of the surface? Finally, will the study of these so far inexplicable manifestations shed any new light on the riddle of the canals or, in fact, of the whole of this mysterious little world?"

WILL DISCUSS GOOD ROADS IN REGION
REGINA, Sask., Aug. 29.—The motorist and the roads he travels will be under intensive discussion when the Canadian Good Roads Association holds its convention here from Sept. 25 to 27 next. All the multifarious aspects of highway building and maintenance and the varying traffic problems are up for annual discussion. Progress made in the past year to be reported and prospects for next year's activities reviewed.

The association is emphasizing its dominion-wide nature by holding the meeting here, since this will make the eighth different province held. Only Prince Edward Island remains unvisited.

The huge list of subjects to be introduced by experts and discussed by the delegates from all parts of the dominion shows no heavier than anything else the importance of the meeting to the Canadian motorists and the dominion generally. They include improvements in methods of construction, modern methods in building gravel roads, treatment of roads with dust-layers and preservatives, civic responsibility for road improvement, conservation of road materials, responsibility of the dominion government in provincial highways, with special reference to further federal aid in future, design of cement concrete highways and bridges, interprovincial co-operation, gasoline tax, speed regulation and highway traffic and safety signs.

Women Take Cace To Privy Council

Nellie McClung, M. L. A. of Alberta, and Madame Marchand of La Federation de Canadiennes Francaises, who appeared in person with a request that Magistrate Emily Murphy be appointed by the Government to fill a vacancy in Alberta's representation in the Upper House.

In 1923 there appeared somewhat mysteriously on the "Orders of the Day" on June 25 in the Upper Chamber at Ottawa a petition to His Majesty praying that the word "female" be inserted before the word "persons" in Section 24 of the B. N. A. Act. To this motion however, there was carefully or carelessly hatched a further section asking that no senator be allowed to hold office after 70 years of age. No sponsor came forward to push this motion. It was bound to be bitterly opposed on account of the last clause which was dropped.

Last year the women interested in achieving this milestone in the complete enfranchisement of women in Canada decided to take the vexatious question entirely from the realm of politics into that of the law. An appeal was made to the Supreme Court of the Dominion on the question "Does the word 'persons' in Section 24 of the British North America Act, 1867, include female persons?" Touching this action Magistrate Murphy pointed out that under Section 60 of the Supreme Court Act, provision is made that "important questions of law and fact, touching the interpretation of the British North America Act, may be referred by the Governor-General in Council to the Supreme Court for hearing and consideration." The Act further provides that all reasonable fees for such action may be paid by the Minister of Finance, for the interested parties' making the appeal, from monies appropriated by Parliament for purposes of litigation. A still further provision makes it possible in case of an adverse judgment from the Canadian Supreme Court, to bring the matter to His Majesty in Council.

It was under the second provision that the five appellants backed by the Alberta Government went before the Supreme Court and under it that the services of Hon. N. W. Rowell were secured and paid for by the Dominion Government, to argue their case, although the federal and Quebec governments were upholding the negative side of the argument.

And it is under the last provision that these appellants are now acting in taking the matter to the Privy Council for final judgment.

The latest action by the women is unlikely to be influenced by the announcement from Ottawa that steps will be taken to secure necessary amendments to the B. N. A. Act to admit women to the Senate. The women have apparently found that the road through any governmental machinery of whatever party, is a long road. Constitutionalists state that the success of any such governmental action is dependent on the consent of both the Commons and Senate and that it may also be dependent on the consent of every provincial legislature.

Women feel that the consent of the Senate is very far from certain. Such action may be refused to extend to its women even the province franchise, they feel their position is a little more than doubtful. Therefore they prefer to rely on an appeal for interpretation from the Privy Council, rather than on the slower method of legislation.

As the Dominion is not opposing their procedure the women hope that the result is a foregone conclusion and that at last the women of Canada will be declared in law and fact "persons" for all purposes.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Aug. 29.—The foreign demand for grain today showed improvement and a business generally in all quarters was reported dull which would indicate that buyers were not disposed to operate at the present level of prices. On account of decline in wheat and oat futures at Winnipeg local cash prices for car lots were reduced one cent per bushel. Sales of Manitoba No. 5 wheat were made at \$1.10, tough No. 6 wheat at \$1.02, feed wheat at \$0.80. Argentine corn at \$1.08 and American corn at \$1.00 per bushel. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat flour were firmly maintained under a moderate demand. The milled market was active and steady. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats were quiet and prices were unchanged. The undertone to the egg market continued firm with a fair volume of business passing in all grades. The receipts were 7,050 cases. The demand for imported beans was confined to small lots but the tone of the market was steady and prices were unchanged. Sales of choice white handpicked were made at \$4.10 to \$4.20 per bushel, ex-store, and car lots to arrive were quoted at \$3.90 to \$4.00 per bushel, ex-wharf. Owing to the fact that buyers have provided for their wants for the time being the butter trade was quieter but prices were well maintained. The receipts were 31 packages. The feature of the local cheese trade was the weaker feeling that developed and spot prices were reduced 1-4 cent to 3-8 cent per pound. This was attributed to the continued indifferent attitude of English exporters. The trade was quiet. The receipts were 3,733 boxes.
