THE CORONATION.

It is related of Philip of Macedon that he employed a servitor whose sole duty it was to proclaim in the hearing of the King as he sat down to each successive meal, "Philip, remember that thou art mortal." It has been true in all ages, and true alike of Kings and subjects, that they have been prone to forget the one inevitable possibility whose onset may come at any moment, and is liable to cause the greatest changes in human affairs. All British subjects were reminded of this when the sudden and alarming illness of King Edward caused the postponement of his coronation in June last.

For that event when the date was first fixed great and elaborate preparations were made. Had His Majesty been crowned on the 28th of June the occasion would have been celebrated with such pomp and display of wealth and power as had seldom if ever been seen on earth. But the great state ceremonial, was providentially and mysteriously prevented by the King's sudden and alarming illness. In an hour "the pomp of heraldry and pride of power" were relegated to the background. We were called to lay our earthly fancies down, to realize that the King was mortal and to spend weeks of humble and prayerful anxiety while he lingered in the valley of the shadow of death.

Now that the King has been granted a fair recovery, the second date appointed for his crowning and anointing is approached by both Sovereign and people in a very different spirit from what was possible seven weeks ago. The national pride is abated and in its place has arisen some consciousness of our dependence upon a Power greater than is enshrined in earthly throne or crown or sceptre, and with it a sense of general thankfulness that a much loved Sovereign has been spared to his people. The lesson was doubtless a necessary one to both the King and his subjects, else it would not have been given.

With hearts chastened by the disappointment and concern of the past few weeks and with heartfelt thanks that the King has been spared, the august ceremony fixed for to-morrow will be celebrated none the less heartily and loyally in all portions of the Empire. If there is less pomp and parade than might otherwise have signalled the occasion, the attachment between the King and his people—the real bond which binds the Empire together—will be nothing abated but rather made stronger than before. A solemn recognition of Him by whom King's reign and a renewal of the binding compact between Sovereign and people—of just rule tempered by mercy on the one hand and of loving fealty on the other—these are the essentials of the coronation service. And who shall say that these may not be more deeply impressed upon both King and people in the ceremony of to-morrow than they could have been had no postponement been rendered necessary?

We trust that the people of Charlottetown and of the Province generally will join very heartily in the observance of this rare and august occasion. Especially it is desirable that the children of all classes and creeds should do so, as we are

assured they will. Under our free and just Government the throne and crown are not symbols of tyranny or of oppression. They stand rather for equality of right, for well-ordered liberty, and for even-handed justice—

That sober freedom out of which there springs
Our loyal passion for our temperate Kings.

We can render no better service to the Empire, to the age in which we live, or to liberty itself than to impress upon the children the lessons of loyalty and patriotism, and the value of the free institutions under which we live. The hearty observance of Coronation Day will doubtless have this effect, and the children of today are the medium by which the lesson will be carried forward farthest into the dim and distant future.

According to Reuter's Pretoria correspondent the cost of living and especially of housekeeping in that city are very much higher than the Canadian standard. House rent, even in cases where the premises occupied are of the humblest description, is exorbitant, seldom falling below £300 a year. A cook's wages are from £7 to £10 monthly, a kaffir house boy's from £4 to £5. The minimum cost of feeding a horse is £30 a year. Meat from colostrage depots costs from 1s to 1s 2d a pound. Fresh killed meat is unobtainable. Railway travel, first class, costs 3d per mile. Even newspapers cost 3d. From the above figures it will be possible to form an idea of the difficulty the married civil servant, drawing a salary of from £500 to £700, has in making ends meet.
