## Nova Scotia has Plans for Good Road Program

HALIFAX, March 20.—That \$13,000,000 would be expended upon the roads of Nova Scotia during the next five years in an ambitious program that would give the province the best average of roadways on the North American continent, was the announcement made by Hon. H. H. Wickwire, Minister of Highways, who laid the report of the commissioner of highways upon the table in the House of Assembly today. He said the program which has been adopted by the Nova Scotia Government covered a period of five years. This was because the Federal Government had granted for five years and it had been felt advisable to correlate the two. This year the proposal was to expend \$2,605,000 on the roads of Nova Scotia.

## AN X-RAY MOVIE MACHINE.

An X-Ray moving picture machine, which will reproduce on a screen the whole process of the digestive organs from the time the food is eaten until it is wholly digested, has been invented and perfected by a Boston physician and well-known medical and surgical science in modern times. Stories of this Boston invention, its perfection and preliminary trials were brought to light by the recent cables from France to the effect that two eminent Paris surgeons had invented an X-Ray movie machine.  
 Within a few weeks, prominent Boston physicians and surgeons will be mobilized and invited to a professional trial of this new machine. People will be photographed in the act of eating. The film will be developed just as are the seven-reel dramas, and projected on a screen where the doctors will be able to follow the whole course of the digestive organs.  
 Heretofore surgeons had no better way of determining the exact difficulty of a diseased organ than to operate, declares the inventor. "After the knife has bared the infected part the surgeon may see the cause or seat of the trouble. The X-Ray has aided somewhat but cannot be used in determining where the organs fail to function because, like ordinary photography, the picture is a still."  
 "Countless minor operations and troubles of the digestive organs may be eliminated. Many cases of appendicitis may be corrected without the knife if the X-ray moving picture machine were used to photograph the organs. If there is difficulty the cause will not only be photographed plainly, but the effect on the whole system will be shown absolutely as it takes place in the human body. Many surgical cases can, in this way be permanently remedied by treatments without the aid of the knife."  
**Goose Grease as Shortening.**  
 One-quarter of a cupful of goose grease, three-quarters of a cupful of sugar, one beaten egg, one-half cupful of milk, one and one-half cupfuls of sifted flour three teaspoonful baking powder, one-half teaspoonful of salt.  
 Cream the fat and sugar, add egg and milk and lastly the flour, baking powder and salt sifted together. Spread top with sugar and cinnamon and butter or shortening. Bake twenty-five minutes in a rather hot oven.  
**Rich Waffles.**  
 Two and one-half cupfuls of flour, one-half teaspoonful of salt, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-half teaspoonful of soda, one-quarter cupful of sugar, two eggs, one and one-half cupful of milk, salt to eight tablespoonfuls of goose grease.  
 Mix in order given. Cook in well greased hot waffle iron or hot ungreased aluminum waffle iron. Add only very ice-cold water.

## HINTS FOR The Motorist

### PUTTING THE CAR BACK "ON THE JOB"

Test Out The Car Indoors Before Taking To The Road

Motor car parts sometimes become badly stuck during long idle periods, and it is essential to lubricate all joints in brake rods and other control linkages with thin oil to make them work freely. Multiple disc clutches, unless they are left blocked in the disengaged position, not infrequently cannot be re-acted by the pedal and their discs have to be forced apart. While the car is still jacked up it is well to turn the wheels by hand on each gear separately, as a test that final drive gear differential and speed shafts, as well as universals are not dangerously stiff. If the engine is perfectly free and has plenty of oil in its base, it can safely be started by the self-starter and the moment that it is in action the oil pressure gauge or oil indicator should be consulted to find out if it is circulating properly. If not it should be stopped at once and the cause of the trouble determined and removed and even though lubrication seems correct the engine should be allowed to run idle at low speed for sometimes, in order that oil may become thoroughly distributed. By speeding up the engine momentarily, it can readily be told by the ammeter, whether the generator is charging the battery and if it is not, it may be that the cut-out is stuck or the commutator has accumulated carbon. With the wheels still jacked up, and the engine running, it is a good idea to put the car through all its gears, to insure that they shift perfectly and to test the action of the steering gear and brakes before removing the blocking and taking a road test.

## 30,000 CANADIANS AWARDED THE 1914 STAR

Thirty thousand Canadians have been awarded the 1914-15 Star, date, awarded to the records of the Militia Department at Ottawa. Applications are still being received for them, and there are probably still hundreds of men and many women, who are eligible for them, but have not received them yet.  
 The staff of the records branch has been kept busy issuing "King's certificates of discharge," and is distributing them through the distribution bureau. Hundreds of applications are being dealt with daily, and this entails considerable time and labor, as all records of individuals making such application must be looked into carefully.  
 The honors and awards section of the branch receives many requests and queries from soldiers' widows are particularly numerous and they cover a wide range of subjects. The Memorial Cross to be awarded widows and mothers of deceased soldiers and the subject of many these days. But the most common letters all the way to Penland read many several of which have been given out in the last couple of months.  
 There are no signs of either the Allied Victory Medal nor British Service Medal for Canadians yet. While the Militia Department has received considerable correspondence on the subject of both awards no word as to when the actual medals may be expected by the Government has come to Canada yet.

## KINGS AND THE HIGH COST OF LIVING

With the loss of royalty in many of the warring countries of Europe, the new governments will not have to pay such large salaries to heads of State. With the passing of the Kaiser, the Berlin Government alone will save some \$3,000,000. The Emperor of Austria-Hungary found it hard to keep the wolf off the doorstep on \$4,520,000, while the late Zar cost his children \$5,000,000 at least every year. Zar Ferdinand cost Rumania for his "foxy" services \$500,000, besides sundry other items upon which a Commission is at present investigating. The kings of Germany states having either been deposed or having abdicated, will save for that needy country some \$10,000,000 in royalties, each year. The Crown Prince of Germany has already complained of the paucity of his income, which he fears will land him in bankruptcy unless he can devise means to dispense with his twelve servants, three gardeners, and other indispensable aids to his daily comfort of body and mind. With kings, or at least many of them, the question of the high cost of living does not mar their nights—the want of a job is the nightmare with which they are afflicted.

 the Medical Branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment.  
 Statistics recently compiled show that 8,676 ex-service men have been treated in sanatoria maintained by this Branch. Of that total 6,636 had been discharged from these institutions, some as cured, and others in quiescent condition. At the time of the survey there were 2,042 patients undergoing treatment of whom 158 had had previous treatment and had been re-admitted to a sanatorium. This percentage of 7.7 per cent. of re-admission is regarded as being of the success of the efforts of the Medical Services in coping with tuberculosis among ex-service men.  
 Men who have been under treatment in sanatoria and whose condition on discharge from treatment is such that they require a certain amount of rest and relief from the necessity of earning a full livelihood, are, by arrangement with the Board of Pension Commissioners, usually granted a total disability pension for a period of six months after discharge from an institution.  
 The Vocational Branch has given special attention to the retraining of the tuberculous patients who cannot return to previous occupations, and similarly, the Information and Service Branch has made provision for placid such men in touch with employment opportunities.  
 The Social Service Nurses of the Medical Branch keep in touch with former patients and give assistance, or advice, where such is required.  
 There are Medical Representatives in every city, town and village of Canada to whom men may apply for medical attention.

## LAY IN SUGAR

OTTAWA, March 20.—Housewives of Canada are urged to begin now laying in a supply of sugar for the coming season, buying a few pounds extra each week from now on, until they have sufficient set aside to cover their canning requirements. Control over import and export licenses for sugar has been vested in the Canadian Trade Commission, which body will grant no export licenses while there is a demand in Canada for sugar. However, there is no likelihood of a reduction in prices, and it is pointed out that because of increased population, higher wages, and prohibition, the consumption of sugar has increased 20 per cent.  
 In regard to prohibition it is stated that many people are taking to sweets as stimulants, where they formerly consumed liquor. It is pointed out also that Canadian refiners could secure at the present time an average of \$1.35 per hundred more by exporting their sugar to the United States market, than they can get in Canada, but despite this they will not be allowed to export while there is a demand here.
