RELIGIOUS SERVICES ST. DUNSTAN'S BASILICA Masses were celebrated at the regular hours on Sunday. In the evening at 7 o'clock devotions were conducted by Rev. HOLY REDEEMER CHURCH The regular morning Masses took place at The Holy Redeemer Church Sunday. Reverend Jos. McGreel, C.S.S.R., preached very instructive sermons on the Gospel of the day. In the evening at 7 o'clock there was Vespers and Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. The last of the Advent sermons on Christmas Marriage was preached by Reverend G. M. Murphy, C.S.S.R. The Reverend Father's sermon was very instructive, and as in previous sermons he handled his subject in a masterly and eloquent manner.

ZION CHURCH In Zion Church on Sunday morning Rev. G. C. Webster paid a fitting tribute to the late Rev. George C. Taylor. Mr. Taylor, he said, had been a faithful servant of the church while in Zion and that he had come to Zion Church in rather difficult days when Rev. Mr. Strathcone who was minister at that time, took ill and died, at a time when they were building the new church. His ministry had been most successful while here. He referred to his overseas service as chaplain of the 105th battalion. His thirteen years of service was of great value not only to Zion Church but to the city of Charlottetown and the district round about. He had been called in 1925 to Montreal, where his pastorate had again met with success and blessing.

LIVESTOCK (Canadian Press) CATTLE: Montreal, Dec. 19—Cattle receipts were 287 today. The comparative low prices paid for cattle during the past two weeks, coupled with the fact that buyers are generally cautious, caused much lighter receipts. There were only 137 fresh cows over the week end. Despite the better run, bids were slow and were not enough early sales to set a basis for market quotations. Receipts 220. With a slight increase in the chief receipts, sales were 25 cents higher. The bulk of the sales were only of plain or just medium quality. Fair to just medium cows were sold at \$5.50 to \$6, with some good kinds around \$6.25. A few good cows were sold at \$7 for a couple of choice cows. Drunkers ranged from \$3.50 to \$4.50. Cows were selling from \$3 for common kinds to \$2.75 for one of 73 calves. Quotations: Good and choice veal \$3 to \$4; common and medium \$2 to \$3.25; grassers \$2 to \$2.75. Sheep receipts 524. Lambs were sold at 25 cents higher. Medium to good good ewes and wethers were sold at \$4.50 to an odd sale at \$4.75. A few small lots of the best ewes and wethers brought \$5. Culls and bucks were sold at \$1.50 to \$2.50. Hogs receipts 3,619. Between 400 and 500 hogs were weighed early at \$4.50 to \$4.75, fed and watered for good quality. As compared with \$4 last week, the balance of the hogs were not sold at time of writing. Sows were sold at \$4.75 to \$5; common \$3.50 to \$4.50.

Ruling In Case Of Mine Workers SYDNEY, N. S. Dec. 19—(Canadian Press)—"So long as the United Mine Workers of America preserve its identity and is intact as a going concern, a dissentient body, such as the Amalgamated Mine Workers of Nova Scotia, has no legal claim on property of the parent body." This is the ruling handed down by Mr. Justice W. F. Carroll of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, upholding the injunction granted the U. M. W. against the use of funds collected by that organization and deposited under a private account by officers of the A. M. W. when the rival organization was formed.

IN MEMORIAM SAMUEL GAY It was with great regret that the relatives of Samuel Gay a native of Dundas, P. E. Island, heard of his death in his adopted home in Las Vegas, Nevada on August 24th, 1932, after an illness that lasted but three weeks. The late Mr. Gay was born in Dundas 73 years ago. He was the son of Abner Gay and his first wife, Christina Nicholson. A great many sons of Dundas have gone to Western America in years gone by, and many of them have had adventurous careers, but it is doubtful if any of them had a more exciting one than did Samuel Gay. For a period of (26) twenty-six years he was High Sheriff of Las Vegas, Nevada, a difficult and an important position. He was first elected High Sheriff when the lawless elements in the community were in a defiant mood and he had promised if elected to bring in respect for law and order, and he soon did so, and he was elected to the sheriffship again and again. He was an extremely strong man even for a native of Dundas, where strong men are common. He was a member of the Elk Society, and his funeral was in charge of that order. He was buried in Woodland Cemetery Las Vegas, Nevada. Mr. Gay visited his boyhood home in Prince Edward Island in 1931. Mrs. D. M. Nicholson, Miss Flora Nicholson, Mr. Wm. Nicholson, Mrs. A. McLeod of Dundas, Mrs. John McLeod, Primrose and Mrs. John Howlett Annandale are first cousins to the late Mr. Gay, he has a number of other relatives in this province. He was never married.
