Agree To World Wheat Conference

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Jan. 12.—The International Wheat Advisory Committee, attempting to solve a double problem of huge surpluses and low prices, agreed today to call a world conference to consider the wheat situation.

Such a meeting, the first since 1933, will be subject to general acceptance of agenda. A sub-committee including Canada, the United States, Great Britain and Argentina was appointed to work out details of that problem.
