VIENNA, Sept. 6.—At a conference of 500 delegates representing all the Austrian Railway men's societies, a demand was formulated yesterday for 20 per cent. increase in wages, on the ground of increased cost of living. Several delegates advocate a general strike.

THE GERMAN NAVY SECOND IN THE WORLD.

KIEL, Sept. 6.—The fleet that assembled here yesterday is believed by German experts to give Germany, for the first time the rank of the second naval power in the world, ousting the

United States from the position which it held by a slender margin last year.

While the three new battleships, the German ships armed with 12 inch guns, did not take part in the review, they attracted much attention as they lay at anchor in the harbor.

MILLS RESUME IN NEW ENGLAND

BOSTON, Sept. 6.—A change for the better occurred in many cities, and States yesterday, when the textile mills, employing an aggregate of 55,000 persons, resumed operations after shutting down for a time varying from eight days to two weeks or more.
