Open House At R.C.A.F. Stations

OTTAWA, June 13—(CP)—Canadians, well-schooled by information services in the exploits of the wartime R.C.A.F., will get a chance to see their peacetime air force in action tomorrow at flying stations throughout the country. It is "open house" at air stations all across Canada, and stations, lacking in the wartime air power which made Canada a centre for empire flying training, will make up for it in ingenious way. Some will even sport day nurseries where mothers can leave their younger children while touring the station to find out about the life and work their offspring may be doing if they join the Air Force in the future. Announcing air force day in an address, Defence Minister Claxton stressed to Canadians that: "It's your Air Force." The Minister asked Canadians to "come to the Air Force station and see how the men live and what is going on."

Predicts Decade Of Industrial Strife

WASHINGTON, June 13—(CP)—John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers' Journal said today "it looks like we are in for a decade of industrial, political and economic hell unless the Supreme Court throws the new Union-curbing labor bill 'into the discard.' The publication labelled the legislation, now on President Truman's desk for action, the "N.A.M. (National Association of Manufacturers)-Tatt-Hartley bill." President Truman, who returned to the United States after a three-day state visit to Ottawa, is to make known his stand on the bill next week. He can either sign it and make it law or exercise the Presidential veto and refer it back to Congress for further consideration.

600 Air Cadets To Train At Summerside

Approximately 600 Air Cadets from Maritime Air Cadet Squadrons will take summer training at the Summerside R.C.A.F. station this summer. The first course will commence on July 5th. The course will last two weeks and there will be four courses.

This will be the only type of training given at the Summerside station this summer. It was originally expected that navigational instruction for Air Force personnel would commence in June but it is not now expected to start before the fall. Squadron Leader W. C. Langstaff, D.F.C., and Bar is commanding officer of the Summerside station and Squadron Leader W. Davy will be commanding officer of the Air Cadet camp. While in camp the cadets will live the life of an airman. They will have a comprehensive course of instruction which will include the following subjects: aero engines, aircraft recognition, air frame construction, airmanship, armament, bases, radio theory, and equipment, drill, flying hygiene, sanitation, and first aid, leadership and morale, meteorology, navigation, photography, physical training, radio telephone procedure and signals organization, service familiarization and history of the R.C.A.F.

This sounds like a pretty stiff course but there will also be one hour flying time for each cadet divided into two flights. Four Dakotas will be assigned to the Summerside station for this training. As far as facilities permit there will also be special activities such as range shooting, swimming, picnics, entertainment films and sport. The spiritual side of their lives will also be looked after and both Protestant and Catholic Chaplains will visit the station during the camps. At the conclusion of each camp there will be a formal inspection on the parade grounds of the station.

Concludes Potato Export Contracts

OTTAWA, June 13—(CP)—The Agricultural Prices Support Board announced today it has closed its books successfully on the problem of disposing of surplus Maritime potatoes. Shipment last week of the final lot of 70,349 long tons of potatoes to the United Kingdom concluded a record export contract with that country which was part of a program undertaken by the board last fall when growers were faced with a heavy surplus and the likelihood

of declining prices. Other points in the program were the establishment of an advance price, effective May 1, of \$1.75 per 75 pounds of all unsold New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island No. 1 potatoes, bagged, inspected and delivered to railway shipping point. Growers, however, had not found it necessary to accept the board's floor price. J. G. Taggart, chairman of the Board, said the record shipments to the United Kingdom had relieved the domestic market of 2,600,000 bushels, and that the Board had subsidized the conversion to starch of an additional 500,000 bushels. A further 1,000,000 bushels had been sold to other countries and a record quantity of 20,000 carloads had been moved to

Central Canada compared with 11,000 the previous year. "So effective were these measures," the Board's statement added, "that present potato stocks are reduced to normal levels, with new potatoes from the United States now being admitted to Eastern Canada."

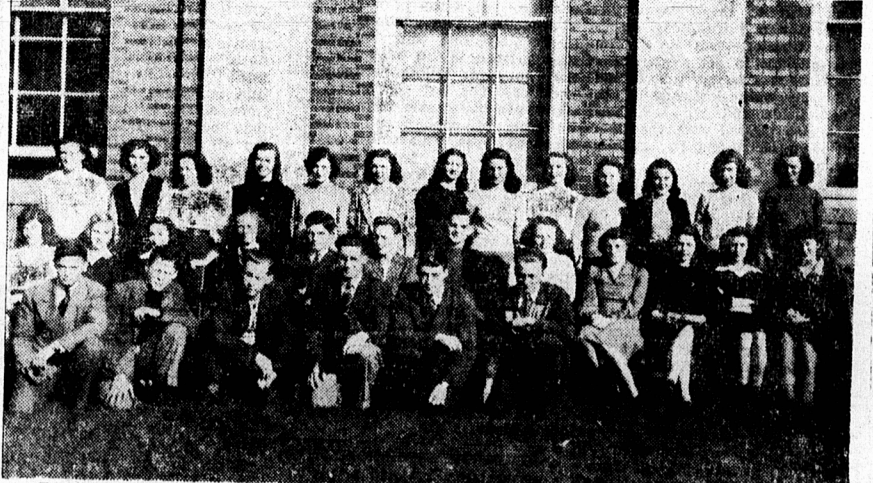

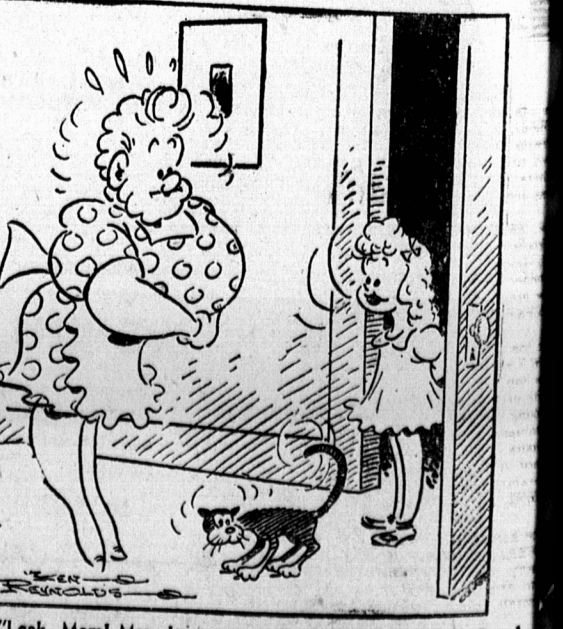
