## ABEGWEITS ADVANCE IN JR. PLAYDOWNS

### Defeat Amherst St. Pats In Second Encounter 6-2 To Take Series Round 16-8

AMHERST, N. S., March 9.—(CP)—Charlottetown Junior Abegweits advanced to the semi-finals of the Maritime Junior hockey playdowns tonight with a 6-2 victory over Amherst St. Pats, last year's champions, that gave the Prince Edward Island team both of the home-and-home games and the round 16-8.

The Abbies had little difficulty in disposing of the Amherst team and removing the crown St. Pats had worn two years as Maritime junior champions. The Islanders were faster skaters, possessed more finish around the net and featured an effective blocking defence that kept the Irish in check throughout.

### Rally To Win After Jittery First Period
