N. R. Earnings Are Increasing
MONTREAL, Feb. 29.—An increase of \$1,094,834.19 or 6.16 per cent is shown in the gross earnings of the Canadian National railways during January 1928, as compared with the corresponding month of last year, according to the official summary of earnings of the National system in January 1928, excluding lines east of Lewis and Diamond Junction, and excluding Central Vermont lines were \$15,671.00 as against \$17,776,836.81 in January 1927.
During the month of January 1928 operating expenses also showed an increase, the figures being \$17,665,938 in January 1928 against \$15,444,735.87 in January 1927, an increase of \$2,221,202.13 or 3.88 per cent.
Net earnings during the first month of the present calendar year were \$2,321,011.07 against \$2,226,904 in January 1927, an increase of \$94,107.07 or 4.23 per cent.
The operating ratio in January 1928 was 87.70 per cent against 87.44 per cent in January 1927.

THE MARKETS
(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 29.—There was an improved demand from foreign buyers for grain here today and a moderate amount of business was done in Manitoba grades of wheat. Owing to the strength that developed in the Winnipeg future market for one day today the local market for spot stocks was stronger and prices were advanced one cent per bushel. The volume of business in spring wheat flour for export account was small but a moderate trade was done with local and country buyers at unchanged prices.
A fair amount of business was done in winter wheat flour and the undertone was firm. A feature of the millfeed trade was the stronger feeling that developed for all lines and prices were marked up one dollar per ton. This was attributed to the good demand and the small supplies. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was quiet and prices were firm. Prices for all grades of fresh and storage eggs were firmly maintained and the demand continued active. The receipts were 768 cases. A firm feeling prevailed in the market for potatoes but the volume of business was somewhat of a limited character owing to the small offerings of Quebec grades. The tone of the market for imported beans was steady under a fair demand, car lots of choice white handpicked, arrivals were quoted at \$3.10 per bushel, ex-track, and smaller quantities sold at \$3.20 per bushel ex-store.
A fair amount of business was accomplished in straight car lots of butter and prices were unchanged. The receipts were 1,239 packages. The demand from English buyers for cheese showed some improvement and a little business was transacted. The local trade was fair and the undertone was firm. The receipts were 1,82 boxes.
