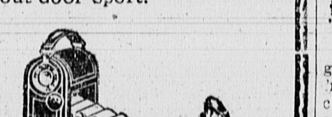

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Teachers' Association

A Meeting of the Executive of the Teachers' Association of P. E. Island was held in this city Friday afternoon. There were present Misses E. Duffy, L. Fitzgerald, Beairto, C. Munn and Messrs. McEwen, Wynne, Seaman and Francis. A number of important questions were up for discussion, the most important being on the formation of a Teachers' Union for P. E. Island. After considerable discussion in which it was clearly shown that resolutions and delegations urging the Government to raise the teachers' salaries are no longer of any avail, owing to the fact that the Government is spending about one-third of the revenue of the province on Education, the following resolution, which has already been endorsed by the Charlottetown Teachers' Institute and approved of by the Executive of the Eastern Teachers' Association was unanimously passed:

"Whereas the salary at present paid to teachers of this province is insufficient in view of the increased cost of living, therefore resolved that steps be taken at once to organize a Teachers' Union, whose object shall be to secure a larger remuneration for service rendered."

The meeting then immediately resolved itself into committee, the question was thoroughly discussed, and a plan of campaign agreed upon. It was unanimously agreed that the work be pushed with vigor, so that the organization may be, if possible, complete before the annual meeting in June.

A committee of representative teachers of the whole Island was then appointed to meet in Charlottetown next Saturday at 1 p. m. Teachers' Union for P. E. Island. A press committee was appointed to secure the cooperation of the press in this worthy enterprise, feeling that the press which has always been a friend of the teachers would lend its influence in this cause. The meeting then adjourned.

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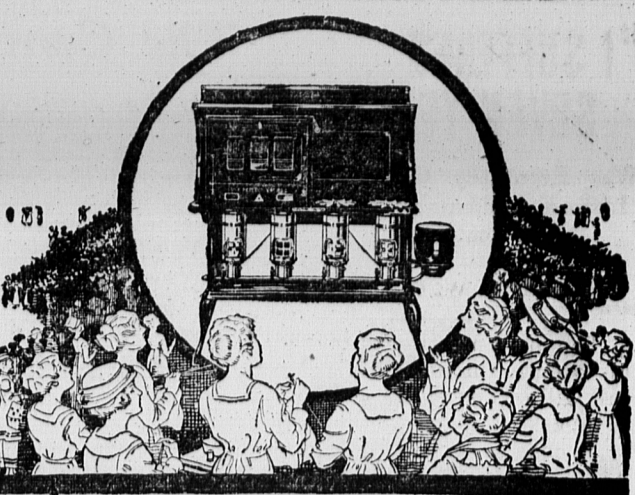
