"He furthermore presented me with the deed of gift, which he had written out in his own hand, and asked me to have several copies typewritten and to present one to the Board of Directors of St. Cecilia's that very afternoon. 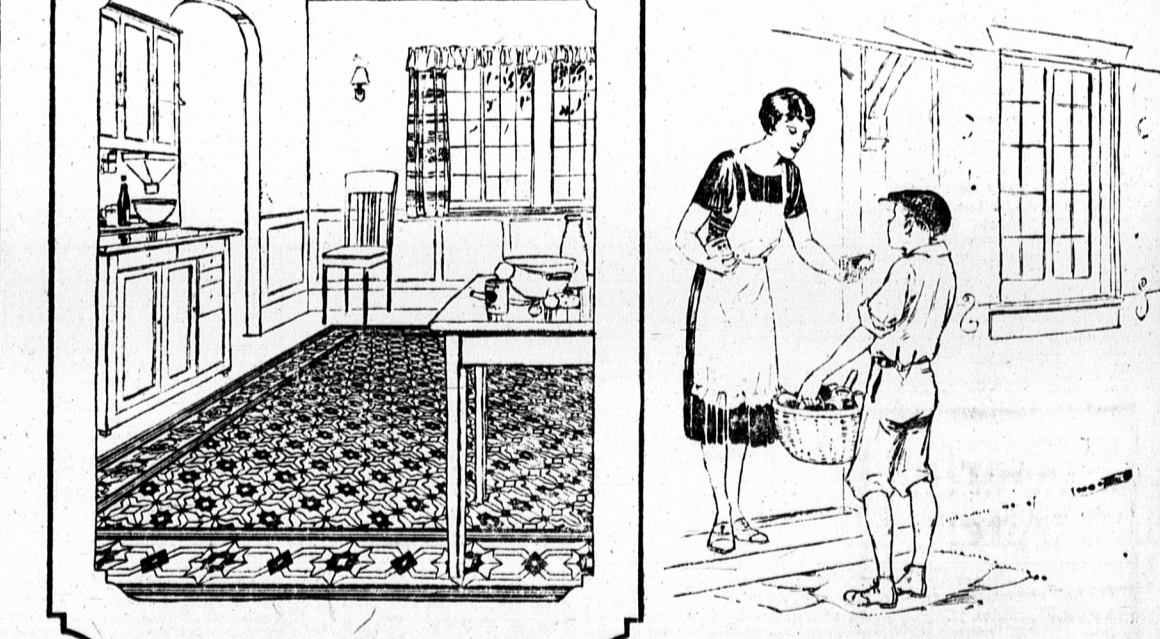
