Visitors are warned to keep at a respectful distance from the cages of the birds of prey, for fingers and even eyes of meddlers have suffered in the past, but the occupants are not all so vicious as they look, and the keeper knows well the particular temperaments of his charges.

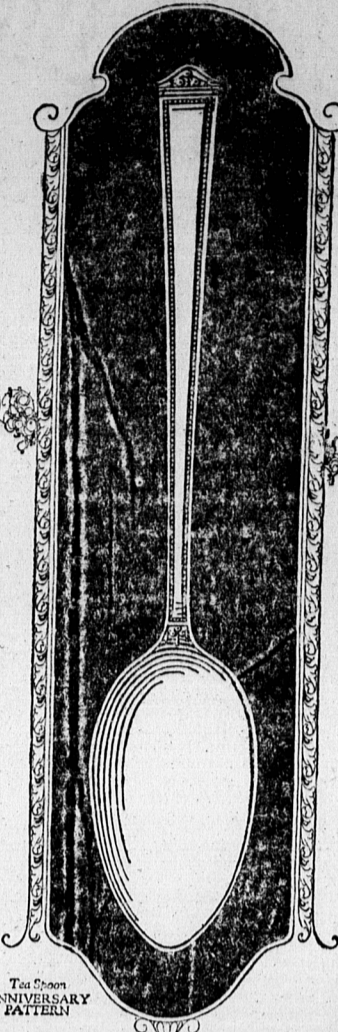
