TIMELY TIPS

Here are some handy tips that will save you work when you next feel like painting furniture or woodwork. To start, see that your paint brush is in good condition, clean and free of hardened paint or varnish. If the paint you are using has thickened in the can, set it in a dish of hot water for a few minutes; it will then flow on easily. To keep hands and fingers free of paint, simply dip them in a dish of turpentine or kerosene. Use just below the brushes; it absorbs the paint that runs back, and prevents it from dripping. Don't neglect your brush before you put it away; remember a good one is hard to replace nowadays. Use turpentine or kerosene to clean it of paint, and follow by washing well with warm water and extra-soapy suds. This softens the bristles and keeps them in good condition until you need the brush again.

Tomato Pepper Sandwiches

Q. How about supplies of children's underwear for this winter?
A. Every manufacturer of children's underwear has been directed to produce larger quantities of garments and more factories have been required to diversify their facilities to the spinning of successful yarns. Distribution plans have been made to ensure an equitable distribution of available supplies to all areas.

Q. I read somewhere that potatoes are to be sold at the same ceiling price as they did last fall and winter. I don't remember what I paid last year. Could you tell me what the ceiling price is here on P. E. I. A. At the present time the ceiling price for Grade A potatoes on P. E. I. is 40 cents per peck.
