THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., May 1.—The demand from foreign buyers for Canadian grain continued of a limited character here today and little business was transacted. The trade in cash grain in the local market was also slow and prices were unchanged. Little business was done in spring and winter wheat grades of flour but prices were well maintained. The feature of the millfeed trade was again the urgent demand from United States buyers and further large sales were made including twenty-two cars of bran for shipment to Boston at \$45 per ton delivered. A good steady trade was also done for local and country account and prices were firm. The inquiry for standard grades of rolled oats was laid but prices were unchanged. The undertone to the egg market was firm with a moderate amount of business passing in all grades. The receipts were 3,684 cases. The potato trade was extremely dull and the tone of the market was easy but there was no further change in values. A weaker feeling developed in the butter market and prices scored a further decline of 1-2c to 3-4c per lb. This was attributed to the indifferent attitude of buyers and the fact that supplies of fresh made butter were accumulating. The receipts were 371 packages. The trade in cheese was inactive but values were well maintained for all grades. The receipts were 3,954 boxes. The market for imported beans was quiet but prices ruled steady.

EGGS

OTTAWA, May 1.—There have been no price changes reported from any Canadian centre but the situation continues very firm. American markets are again higher today.

TORONTO—The local situation is firm and unchanged. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 29-30; firsts 27-28; seconds 22-23, western offerings are scarce.

MONTREAL — This market is steady and unchanged. There is better demand for carlots especially of extras and firsts.

SASKATOON—Egg receipts here are holding steady. Prices are unchanged. With dealers buying from country shippers at extras 25, firsts

23; seconds 18, delivered, cases returned. Storage movement so far, has been slow and it is probable that holdings here this year will be only sufficient for local requirements.

EDMONTON — This egg market is firm with receipts showing a further increase. Buying prices from country shippers are unchanged at extras 24; firsts 22; seconds 17.

ST. JOHN — This market is steady with dealers buying from country shippers at extras 29; firsts 26; seconds 21. The storage movement is still light.
