MAN WHO ATTRACTED SPIRITS

LONDON, Dec. 19.—By the death of Jan Guzik, the news of which has just been received from Warsaw, the spiritualists have lost one of their most enterprising members. Guzik was a man of no half measures. Those who happened to experience his activities will recall him as what may be called essentially a spirit realist.

No mere communings with the great Shades of the Beyond would satisfy him. He would, as it were, himself plunge into the uncharted regions of eternity, and if required bring back the spirit of a dead poodle.

Many a woman bemoaning her long-lost pet has been comforted by feeling the damp muzzle pressed to her cheek, Guzik being the medium.

Known as "the man who attracted spirits," Guzik enjoyed a remarkable reputation in certain spiritualistic circles. Much of this was due to the mystery with which he surrounded his early days. Many of his followers accepted the legend that from his infancy he had lived in the midst of hosts from the other world.

The spiritualist seemed to be possessed of a neat sense of humour, which was occasionally shown to the discomfort of those who doubted his animal "materialisations." More than one keen pursuer of the truth in the cabinet employed by the medium has been pulled up suddenly by a claw or tooth ghostly but tangible. One very well known student of the psychic will remember the blow of a "paw" which he received full in the face when he sought "proof."

SOY-BEANS IN CANADA

The soy-bean is an ancient cultivated plant in China and Japan. It is said to have been introduced into North America during the early years of the eighteenth century. It was not, however, until about 1800 that it began to establish itself in the agriculture of this continent. In Canada the main areas of production are the central and southwestern portions of Ontario. Small areas have been grown in every province in the Dominion and the increasing interest in this crop, in conjunction with the development of earlier maturing varieties, indicates that the future will see a considerable increase in the production of soy-beans in Canada.

HISTORIC FIGURE NOW ATTENDING CANADIAN COLLEGE

He is Peter Keyser, B. A. of The Hague, Holland, and he is now rounding out a most remarkable career by a course in scientific agriculture. Just out of school, at 17 he found himself in Utrecht, a second lieutenant in the Dutch motorcycle brigade, where he served until demobilization in 1919. He was a guard on the Holland frontier when the Kaiser and his son fled from Belgium and received the weapons of the war lord.

A SEANCE

PARIS, Dec. 19.—An hypnotic seance in a Paris cafe ended in unexpectedly tragic circumstances the other day. A group of men and women were discussing hypnotism and spiritualism when one of them claimed to possess hypnotic powers, and challenged another man, named Louis Duc, to sit as a subject. Duc consented, and the other man made a few passes before him.

The hypnotist, turning to his admiring audience, exclaimed triumphantly: "Now he is hypnotized and impervious to pain," and to prove it he struck the subject a violent blow on the face. The man's eyes closed and he fell back, his head striking the floor and knocking down the hypnotist. Duc, then smarting under the blow he had received and the jeers of his friends, rushed from the restaurant, but returned a few minutes later with a pistol, which he fired into his still jeering friends.

Two of the men and a woman were hit by the bullets and were rushed to the hospital seriously injured.

FLEET'S GHOST SHIP

LONDON, Dec. 19.—Among the warships of the Atlantic fleet recently assembled in Scottish waters for gunnery practice is a sloop and bristled veteran, which like a ghost ship, rides the seas without a crew, and is steered by unseen hands. This weird monster was once a battleship of the grand fleet, H. M. S. Centurion, one of the Iron Duke class, and a sloop ship of the Audacious, which was sunk by a mine in the war. Now, she is the wireless-controlled target ship of the Fleet.

Curiously a shattered, dismantled remnant of her former glory, but actually concealing within her heavily-armoured interior marvellous apparatus which, for obvious reasons, cannot be described in detail. Gunless and turretless, and her superstructure smashed to smithereens, the Centurion has already undergone a heavy mauling from the guns of the warships which she now serves in a humble capacity, but, nevertheless, all the damage has been superficial, and her remarkable qualities remain unimpaired. She has a crew of about 250 officers and men, but when she puts to sea to fulfill her functions as a target her complement is disembarked, and she comes under the control of the destroyer, Shikari. The latter vessel, during gunnery exercises, steams a mile or so astern, and by means of wireless waves, determines the movements and speed of the Centurion. The signals from the destroyer are transmitted by numbered telephones. These are received by various little aereals scattered about the Centurion, which automatically repeat back to show that each signal has been received.
