Believe Nazis Working for Spring push

BERNE, March 26 — (AP) — Germany was reported tonight to be pushing a three-way diplomatic drive to smooth the differences which the bazaar maintained for more than a year her Balkan satellites, to bring Bulgaria into war against Russia and to manoeuvre Turkey into a position where the Turks will not hinder a Nazi spring smash toward the Caucasus and its oil.

Political circles in Berlin suggested that King Boris of Bulgaria, en route home after a talk with Hitler, might renounce his old east-Thracian aspirations if this would accomplish a Turkish attitude favorable to the Axis.

This would imply a standstill agreement between Turkey and Germany and perhaps concessions dealing with the Dardanelles or land transit privileges which Turkey thus far has avoided.

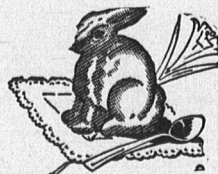

SHAKE DUST OUT OF CURTAINS
Window curtains will need less laundering if the dust is shaken out of them regularly each week. Shake out the dust also before washing. Soak in cool, soapy water for half or three-quarters of an hour, then wash in clean, warm suds. Usually little rubbing will be necessary. Rinse thoroughly in clear water. Dry full length on the line or on stretcher adjusted to the exact size desired.

HOW DO YOU LIKE YOUR EGGS DONE?

Here are some interesting facts connected with the cooking of eggs. Extreme heat toughens the whites of eggs, so that a hard boiled egg will be more tender if allowed to cook slowly in water below the boiling point for at least thirty minutes. In order to obtain best results with poached eggs, high quality eggs should be used, cooking them at below boiling point, draining them well, and serving hot. For ordinary boiled eggs, the water should be heated to boiling point. When the eggs are placed in the water, the saucepan should be transferred to a warm spot on the range where the water will be kept below boiling point. For soft-boiled eggs, allow eight to ten minutes.

To remove streaks easily from hard-boiled eggs, plunge the eggs into cool water as soon as they are cooked. To avoid cracking egg shells in cooking, place the eggs in cold water and bring to a boil. At that point the eggs will be soft-boiled. The whites of eggs are quickly beaten if the eggs and the yolks are cold. Keep eggs in a cool place but it is better not to purchase more than one week's supply at a time.
