



**THE I. O. F.**

The Independent Order of Foresters are inaugurating a vigorous winter campaign, and for the months of November, December, and January are remitting to new members the registration and certificate fees, which applicants usually have to pay upon joining. The order has made wonderful strides during the year, and will add to its membership many thousands during the next three months. Its membership roll now contains a good deal over 200,000 of insured or beneficiary members. Its accumulated funds reach to almost \$8,000,000; and these funds are increasing at the rate of three-quarters of a million dollars a year, notwithstanding that the order pays out \$500 every working hour of the year to widows and orphans. A record of over \$12,000,000 already paid promptly on death claims stands to its credit. The I. O. F. is undoubtedly a great and progressive institution. Thereupon its investment, made by a committee composed of able and independent brethren at the Supreme Count meeting in Los Angeles, stated that in all the investments of its funds the Supreme Executive had never lost a dollar. This is certainly a unique experience.

**INDIA'S GREAT PROSPERITY.**

LONDON, Nov. 10.—In the House of Commons, today, Lord George Hamilton, the secretary of state for India, in submitting the Indian budget statement, pictured the increasing prosperity of India in spite of the ravages of famine, and said the only item showing a decrease in revenue was opium.

The income for the current year was so ample that the government had decided to make a special grant of \$7,500,000 for the relief of the sufferers from drought and famine, and the secretary expected that the surplus would still exceed \$8,500,000. The secretary paid a high tribute to the work of the viceroy of India, Lord Curzon.

**CORNISH MURDER YET A MYSTERY**

CORNWALL, Me., Nov. 10, 1902. The coroner's inquest on the death of Miss Olive H. Brad, who was killed and robbed on the road from the railroad station to Cornish village in Augusta, will be resumed tomorrow. It is probable the verdict will charge the crime to a "person unknown," though there may be an arrest in the case before the next session of the supreme court.


