SEEK CAPTURE BEFORE FIRST SNOW-FALL Land, Sea And Air Forces Combine In Terrific Offensive Along Yangtse.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 26 (AP)—Japanese war river and land forces launched a terrific attack along the Yangtze River front today in a move considered by foreign military observers the beginning of an offensive to capture Hankow before the first snow-fall. The Japanese, slowed up for several months, picked up momentum as severe fighting raged on the shores of Poyang Lake and on both banks of the Yangtze.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26—(AP)—Wash. Post, Secretary of State, warned Japan today that United States public opinion was aroused over the destruction of a Chinese-American commercial airliner by Japanese war planes.
