During her early years she attended "The Birch Hill School" and was generally active in the social life of that section. Her funeral emerged from the home where she was born and died, to St. James Episcopal Church where she joined the other departed members of the family to rest in the promised peace of Eternal Life.

**Group Arrested Accused With Darlan Death**

NEW YORK, Jan. 13 (AP)—A group of men accused of responsibility for the Christmas Eve assassination of Admiral Jean Darlan were arrested Sunday morning in North Africa. CBS Correspondent Charles Collingwood reported to-night in a broadcast from Algiers. Secrecy and censorship prevented earlier announcement. Collingwood said.

The correspondent said further that arrangements now have been made for Gen. Charles De Gaulle, the fighting French leader, and Gen. Henri Honore Giraud, Darlan's successor as head of the French in North and West Africa, to meet soon and attempt to compromise their differences.

The French think they have caught the men who engineered the murder of Darlan, Collingwood said, adding that if their complicity should be established the men would be tried before a military court.

**Weekly Livestock Market**

OTTAWA, CANADA -- Jan. 7, 1943. SUMMARY

Extremely light cattle receipts at stock yards and packing plants resulted in an uptick to 26c to 27c to 50c, at nearly all centres. In eastern Canada particularly the bad weather conditions and blocked roads had certain influences in holding back supplies. All other classes of live stock were also firm sellers, with calves moving up 50c, to \$1.00, hogs selling firmer, and lambs ranging 25c to 50c, at Toronto.

**EASTERN CATTLE MARKETS**

A light cattle run cleared at firm prices on the Toronto market, with sales made mostly to small butchers and out-of-town buyers. Weighty steers topped at \$11.75 and butcher steers and heifers were \$10 to \$11.25. All classes were fairly active on the Montreal market except for the better grades of steers. Good beef steers quoted from \$10.75 to \$11.50, and good cows \$9.75 to \$9.25. Purses were steady in the Maritimes, where medium to good steers were quoted at \$9.75 to \$10.25.

**WESTERN CATTLE MARKETS**

The cattle market at Winnipeg made a good showing on a scarce supply, and prices were unevenly 25c to 50c, higher, with the best of the slaughter steers \$10.75 to \$11.25. At Calgary the trade was topped under a strong demand, and the better classes of steers sold at \$11.50 to \$11.75, while Edmonton bid a top of \$11.25, but mostly \$11; Moose Jaw \$10.50; Regina \$10.50; and Saskatoon \$10.50.

**UNITED STATES MARKET**

Exports to the United States during the past week accounted for 344 dairy cattle, as against 457 in the same week last year. There were no beef cattle or calves exported but in the corresponding week of 1942, 7,501 beef cattle and 364 calves crossed the line. In this paragraph last week's report, the exports of calves for 1941 were given as 5,180. This should have been 81,180.

**CALF PRICES FIRM TO HIGHER**

There was a sharp advance in prices paid for calves, with Toronto moving up 50c, to \$1.07, and selling choice vealers at \$1.07 to \$1.17, Montreal paying as high as \$1.00. Trade in the west was firmer also, with Winnipeg up to \$1.50, Calgary \$1.50, Edmonton up to \$1.50, Moose Jaw \$1.50, Regina \$1.50, Saskatoon \$1.50, and Vancouver \$1.50.

**HOGS STEADY TO FIRMER**

Hog grading during the week ending January 2nd, were 116, 100 head compared with 106,640 in the corresponding week of the previous year. Total marketings during the calendar year 1942 were 6,278,168 as against 6,216,977 for 1941. Toronto was on a basis of \$16.75 to 16.80 for grade B-1 hogs, while Montreal was stronger at \$16.85 to \$17. Winnipeg was firm at \$16.35

**Another Banner Year Predicted In Poultry Industry**

The Executive of the P. E. I. Approved Flock Association met in Charlottetown on the afternoon of Jan. 12.

The President, Mr. Heber MacPhail, occupied the chair, and Director present were: FELIX COUNTY: Herbert Matthews, Albertson; A. E. Stetson, Pictou; QUEEN'S COUNTY: Heber MacPhail, New Haven; Wilfred McDonald, Covehead; KING'S COUNTY: Mrs. E. S. Rose, East Baltic. The Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. A. P. Darrell, Poultry Researcher, was also present.

The financial statement showing a bank balance of \$91.01 was approved and the meeting then gave some particular attention to a review of the work accomplished by this Association which has shown very creditable progress since formation.

Information was tabled setting out that membership this year constitutes a record of 147 brooder flocks to date with the total number of females used in these flocks given as slightly over 10,000 birds, also that some 100 pedigreed male birds are used and these birds are from stock bred especially for egg production.

The meeting felt that the year 1943 would prove to be another banner year for the poultry industry in the Province and that the birds are that at least 500,000 chicks would be produced and sold which would represent an increase of approximately 40% over the 1942 season.

The meeting expressed some concern over the possibility of a shortage of animal protein and milk affecting the quality of breeder flocks during the breeding season. A special recommendation was made to the Provincial Department to investigate wastage of buttermilk and to request some attention be given to utilizing fish waste, especially cod heads, which are known to be dumped back into the sea.

Mrs. Rose of East Baltic felt that the use of unrefined cod liver oil might be further investigated, although the supply of this was probably less than in past years, especially cod heads, which are known to be generally known.

The meeting also felt that greater use could be made of alfalfa and clover as it generally observed that a considerable waste of this occurs in barns housing other livestock.

Attention was also given to the production cost of high quality hatching eggs and the meeting felt that, in view of the fact that special breeder flocks were used and that high quality R. O. P. males were purchased by members of the Association, the breeder's own eggs should receive a substantial premium for eggs of high hatchability on a sliding scale from a possible low of 45c per dozen, basis 80% hatchability, and increasing 1c per dozen for each 1% increase hatchability.

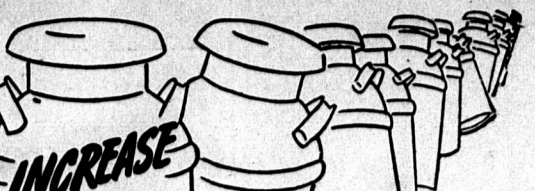
