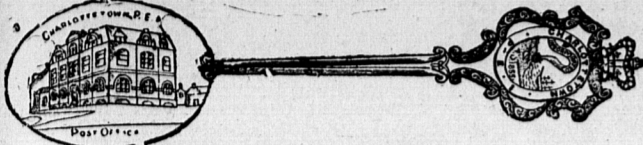

EXHIBITION RACES.

There will be two class races held in connection with the King's County Exhibition, on Wednesday, September 30th, 1908. The classes are as follows:—
2.40 Class, Trot and Pace, Purses \$100.00.
2.50 Class, Trot and Pace, Purses 80.00.

These classes are open to horses owned in King's County for one month previous to the date of the exhibition. Entries close at 8 p. m. Wednesday, September 23rd. Records made at Charlottetown races no bar. All races end at the conclusion of the fifth heat. One may start in every case accompanied entry. Entrances for 5 per cent of purse, and 2 per cent additional from winners. Purse divided, 50 per cent, 25 per cent, 15 per cent and 10 per cent. Five horses to enter and three to start. Horses not barred. National Rules to govern, except when they conflict with the above conditions. Communications must be addressed to the Secretary.

Excursion return tickets will be issued by regular trains from all stations to Georgetown at One Way First Class Fare on September 23rd and 30th, good to return up to and on October 1st, 1908. Tickets at Special Reduced Rates will be issued from Souris, Mount Stewart and Inverness to Georgetown on September 23rd, good to return on the same day. Return tickets from Souris, Inverness, and other stations at proportionate rates.

Passage from Charlottetown, Scottford and intermediate stations may obtain tickets at the reduced rates, and go by regular morning trains on same day, or following morning. Tickets are good only for continuous journey in either direction. Returning special train will leave Georgetown for Souris at 6.30 p. m.
