MR. J. H. BUNTAIN REVIEWS SITUATION

Compares Present Satisfactory Condition with the Lean Years of Previous Administration and Looks Forward to Even Better in the Future.

MR. J. H. BUNTAIN said: When I moved the adjournment of the House I did so for two reasons, 1st, owing to the lateness of the hour and 2nd, because it would afford the Hon. leader of the Opposition time to digest the important facts given out by Hon. members who preceded me.

For over twenty years this Province has been managed by the Liberal party and during that time by carelessness, mismanagement, and incapacity to rule, they allowed the octopus of debt to settle down upon it, and spread its tentacles over it.

The Public Works Department was no longer allowed to throw away the public money in patching up year after year old rotting down bridges of a sort of apology to gain favors.

Consternation reigned, but one bright day,—one of the brightest perhaps in the history of Provincial affairs, the tide turned, the ship of state was guided by a new man at the helm, and from the quarter deck a new course was marked out.

The Hon. member from Crapaud the other evening referred to railways to the North shore. If he were in his place this evening I would extend an invitation to him to join with us an association for the purpose of promoting an agitation in favor of a rail road branch to Rustico and other points on the North shore.

Referring to agriculture and education I will be brief. We have established a short course, a long course, a short course for teachers, Ladies Institutes and Agricultural buildings in which the various farmers' meetings, such as committees, conventions, associations etc. meet, and do business, and we intend to do more.

Mr. Speaker, other Hon. members have spoken concerning the great issue that is going on in the Old World, I will not weary the House with a long reference to it, but will say that we are all proud of the noble stand taken by our nation, and proud of the heroic stand taken by the British soldiers who went into the battlefield ready to conquer or die.

Peace to all to reconcile the temporary separation between contending factions, to engender kind feelings between Temperance men which ought always to exist, and ought never to have been estranged.

PROCEEDINGS IN PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

THURSDAY, April 22, 1915.

The House resumed at 11.30 a.m. His Honour Speaker Wyatt in the chair.

In answer to Mr. J. A. Dewar, the Commissioner of Public Works reported that the Government had under consideration the opening of a road from Mount Hope to Forest Hill. It was also the intention to build a steel bridge over the Grand River at Bridge-town when it was found convenient.

In reply to Mr. Dobie the Commissioner said that he intended again visiting the Tommy Cod Road, Lot 13, with a view to extending a short road in connection therewith. It was the intention of the Government to open a complete road from Cape Egmont Road towards Haldimand Street, a road from Muddy Creek road to Wellington, and a road from St. Timothy to Urbanville Road.

In reply to Mr. Gallant, the Commissioner said he intended taking up the matter of a road from St. Louis Road to Palmer Road.

On the motion of the Premier, Bills were introduced to amend the Electoral Act, Act III of George V., Chap. 7, the Common Law Procedure Act, an Act to amend the Acts imposing certain taxes on certain companies and Associations and Brewers, and an Act to amend the Sheriff's Adverse Claims Act.

Mr. A. P. PROWSE introduced a Bill to incorporate the Graham Hall Co., Ltd.

The third reading of the Quebec Will Bill was taken and the Bill passed. As also were the Land Assessment (Amendment) Bill, the Bill amending the Act respecting Witnesses and Evidence, and the Bill respecting the Registering of Deeds and Instruments.

On the motion of the Premier the House went into committee on the Bill to facilitate the transfer of prisoners from one jail to another.

WHEREAS It is desirable in the interests of the City of Charlottetown to authorise the said City to expend the further sum of thirty thousand dollars in permanent works in addition to the sums heretofore authorised for that purpose.

4. That the payment of two thousand dollars already made by the City of Charlottetown to the Canadian Patriotic Fund be confirmed and the City be authorised to issue a special debenture therefor payable in twenty-five years with interest not exceeding four and one half per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually and with a provision for an adequate sinking fund.

Hon. L. L. JENKINS made a strong objection to the passing of the third clause. He thought that it was unfair to ask a man from the country to pay such a tax. When he came into Charlottetown and worked he paid his board, spent his money in the city and had no vote on that tax.

Mr. ARSENAULT explained that the same by-law was in force in Summerside. During winter there was very little being done in the town and in Summer men came in from the country and worked all the season, in some cases at a cheaper rate than the city labourers.

At 8 o'clock the House resolved itself into committee to consider the bill amending the Charlottetown Incorporation Act. The Premier announced that during the interval he had consulted the promoter of the bill with reference to clause 3, which was in dispute and was allowed to stand over before adjournment at 6 o'clock.

Hon. Mr. McNEILL moved the third reading of a bill to incorporate the Muddy Creek Rural Telephone Co., Ltd. which was passed.

Hon. Mr. McNEILL moved the second reading of a bill entitled "An Act to incorporate the City of Summerside and to amend the Summerside Incorporation Act."

The Premier raised an objection to the following clause, which was struck out: "The Municipal Corporation of the Town of Summerside is hereby created and continued a body corporate by the name of the 'City of Summerside' and as such shall have perpetual succession and a common seal and all the powers and duties now vested in the 'Town of Summerside' by the said Act or any amendments thereof or any by-law of the said Province or by any by-law made under any of the said Acts or otherwise now in force are hereby continued and vested in the 'City of Summerside' and the title 'City of Summerside' is hereby substituted in all the said Acts and by-laws in lieu of the title 'Town of Summerside,' and wherever the word 'Town' is used in any of the said Acts or by-laws the same is hereby repealed and the word 'City' substituted therefor."

Some remarkable scoring was done by McEachern for West Kent and Francis for Queen Square the former scoring 12 and the latter 27 points.

Mr. Donald Nicholson, M.P., was present in the Legislature last night and was an interested listener to the debate on whether Summerside was entitled to be designated a city.

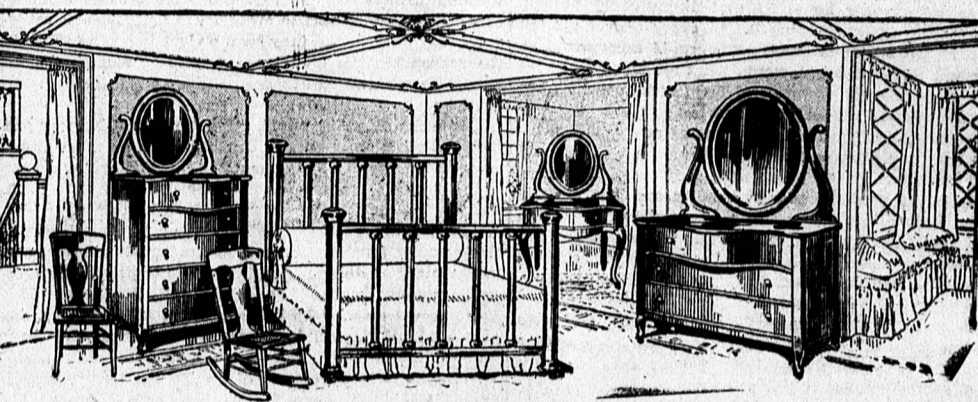
