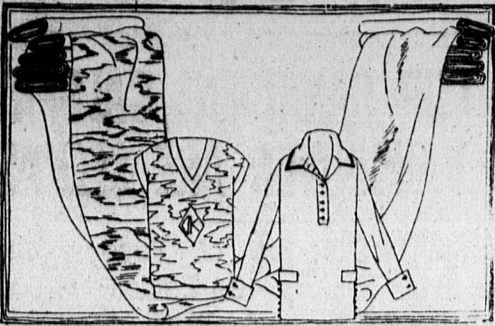

IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN P. BECK.

After a lingering illness of several months with most intense suffering, John P. Beck of White Sands was called to his reward Sunday afternoon, March 2nd, 1924, aged 66 years, 7 mos, 5 days. Mr. Beck was a man of high standing in his community and in the church, his life was above reproach, always sympathetic, and ready to assist in every good work, not often letting his left hand know what his right hand was doing. His delight was in helping others, and the community in which he spent his entire life feels deeply the loss which they have sustained. In his illness friends came from far and near to enquire for his welfare and expressed their deep sympathy, with a willingness to do anything possible if their services could be of any assistance.

Mr. Beck was a member of the Church of Christ at Murray Harbor, very regular in his attendance, liberal in his support of the cause of Christ and always intensely interested in the advancement of the Kingdom of God.

Funeral services were conducted by his pastor, C. E. Armstrong, at his home and at the Methodist Church, assisted by Rev. Mr. Howard.

SIXTIETH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

Central Methodist Episcopal Church, Taunton, of which they have been prominent members for many years, took advantage of the recent sixtieth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Strang to pay a well-deserved tribute of affection and esteem to this worthy couple, says the Zion's Herald of March 12th. The anniversary celebration, held in the church's new Community House, was in charge of the Ladies' Aid Society and the King's Daughters. The pastor, Rev. J. L. Wheeler, as master of ceremonies, referred to the loyal and devoted service which Mr. and Mrs. Strang had rendered to the church, and presented them, in behalf of their friends, with beautiful bouquets. In accordance with a request made by the couple, the reception was of an informal character, but it was an occasion greatly enjoyed by the large number of persons in attendance. Community singing during the evening was in charge of Mr. Lyman Gammons.

Mr. and Mrs. Strang were married Feb. 15, 1864, at St. Eleanor, Prince Edward Island. They came to Taunton, Aug. 1, 1868. For a number of years Mr. Strang was in business as a general contractor, from which he retired about thirteen years ago. The couple joined Central Church soon after their arrival in Taunton and in all the years since have been numbered among the most faithful of its members. The J. W. Strang Men's Club, of which Mr. Strang is a member is named for him. He is active in the Taunton Methodist Social Union and has served the church for many years as steward and trustee. Mrs. Strang was treasurer of the Ladies' Aid Society for thirty years, and was the leader of the King's Daughters for fully as long a period. She is enrolled as a member of the Methodist Social Union, the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies, and the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

The purchase of the fine Community House that is now the property of Central Church was made possible through the generosity of Mr. Strang. After giving a substantial sum towards its purchase, he has labored as a carpenter in making improvements. In fact, he postponed a trip to Florida this winter in the interest of some of these improvements. Mrs. Strang furnished the private dining room in the Community House, and in that room, previous to the anniversary, a dinner party was tendered to Mr. and Mrs. Strang and four other guests.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Strang are quite active still and are in excellent health. They appreciated deeply the honor shown them and seemed to enjoy very greatly the evening's festivities and its many expressions of true fellowship and good cheer. C. E. B.
