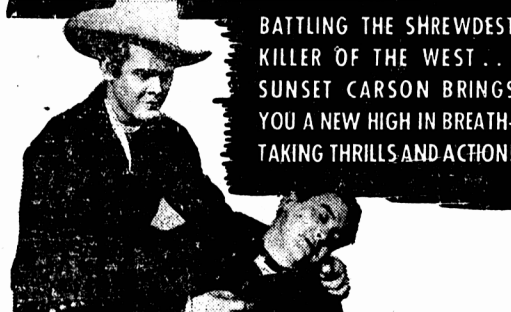

Warns Late Blight Becoming Prevalent

Reports coming in from field inspectors indicate that late blight is present in many potato fields throughout the province. The disease has not been found in serious proportions in any district, but because present weather conditions are now ideal for the development and spread of the disease organism it may easily become serious within a few days.

The seasons of 1944 and 1945 were rather similar to the present one and late blight caused considerable losses during the latter part of the growing season of those two years. Farmers would be well advised to continue the spraying of their fields so that the plants will be protected during the danger period.
