## Further Particulars of Tragic Deaths of Ch'town People

The Guardian reported yesterday that Mrs. James T. Trainor, of 23 King Street, Charlottetown, received the sad news that her two sons, William and Daniel Holland, together with their wives, had been killed in an automobile accident in Boston, and that they were no particulars.

Boston papers' wanders a hand confirm the report of the death of these two couples, but not as the result of an automobile accident. They were the victims of carbon monoxide poisoning, a gas heater having burned out the oxygen in the room.

The papers also mention the names of George A. Dwyelle; and it is reported that Gladys and Charles Holland, children of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Holland, were rapidly sinking at the Cambridge Hospital, where their names are on the danger list. Oxygen has been given them constantly, but despite this their temperatures have steadily risen to 107.

Officials of the Cambridge Gas & Light Company spent five hours at the hospital with the doctors, using the latest and most skilled equipment manufactured for reviving gas victims.

Following are the details of the terrible affair as given in the Boston Post of Monday:—

Five persons were found asphyxiated in a small two-room apartment at 483 Trapelo road in the Waverley section of Belmont yesterday afternoon. Two children who were over come in the same apartment are on the dangerous list at the Cambridge Hospital.

The dead are Mr. and Mrs. William Holland, who had moved into the apartment only the day before; Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Holland and George A. Dwyelle. The last three were relatives and lived in Wrentham street, Dorchester, the Hollandz at No. 74 and Mr. Dwyelle at No. 76.

They had come to assist in straightening the apartment out after he moving.

The children are Charles and Gladys Holland and belonged to Daniel Holland who was a brother of William. Mr. Dwyelle was Daniel's father-in-law.

A gas log that was used to assist in heating the apartment is believed to have been responsible for the atality. Although the log leaked perceptibly, it is believed that the actual cause of death was asphyxiation by monoxide gas resulting from the burning of all the oxygen in the apartment.

How long the five people had been dead prior to the discovery at 2.20 yesterday afternoon is not known, but they were fully dressed and as Daniel had left word that he would return for the night, it is thought that the tragedy occurred shortly after midnight.

The tragedy was discovered by George A. Dwyelle, Jr., and his sister, who on finding that their father and married sister had not returned home Saturday night, went to the apartment to inquire or them.

Seeing the lights glowing on his father-in-law's auto, which stood outside the house, and noticing that he lights were also on in the tenement, he felt that something was wrong.

**Two Children Alive**

Opening the door he beheld the bodies. Although crazed with grief he examined the seven unconscious forms and noticed that the two children were still alive. He picked up the "lady," aged 4 years, in his arms and ran to the street. Hailing a passing taxi he told the driver to rush the child to the Cambridge Hospital.

He then re-entered the tenement and picked up his nephew Charles, aged seven years, and carried him to the home of Dr. P. A. Devaney, who lives close by. He was so unstrung by the "doctors' office" that it was thought he would also collapse.

**Boy Brings Help**

When Dwyelle was carrying his little niece to the taxi, a small boy, seeing that something had happened, ran to a fruit store, where he had seen a few minutes before Motorcycle Officer J. Frank Grant, who was off duty. Receiving the message from the boy that someone was hurt in an accident, Officer Grant rushed to the police box and notified the police station to send an ambulance.

He then ran to the house that the boy pointed out and seeing the unconscious forms on the floor, chairs and beds, ran to the fire house situated close by to get the pumpmotor.

Officer Grant feels certain that George A. Dwyelle and Mrs. Daniel Holland were alive at this time and very effort was made to resuscitate them to no avail, as they were pronounced dead shortly after by Dr. P. A. Devaney.
