In Memoriam

MRS. ELMER McINNIS

The relatives and friends of Mrs. Elmer McInnis were shocked to learn of her sudden death at her home in Borden at the early age of twenty-one years. Although not in good health for the past few years, she was about as usual until the evening of January 14th, when she was suddenly stricken with paralysis and died at her home at 10 o'clock on the morning of January 16th. During her short illness she was visited by her pastor Rev. W. V. MacDonald, who administered the last rites of the Catholic church in which she was a devout member.
