Notes By the Way

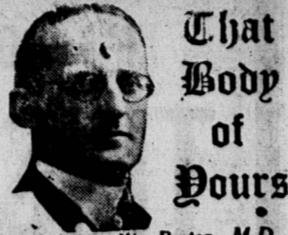
Depositors in the defunct Home Bank who suffered loss by its failure are looking confidently to the federal Government to reimburse them...

MOISTENING THE AIR

You may be living in a well heated home, or working in a well heated office or factory. This is very comfortable of course and you are apt to be satisfied with things...

It would appear that a temperature of about 65 degrees F. and with about 80% moisture or humidity is about right for the average person...

Now the higher the temperature the more moisture the air will hold. By using hot air, hot water, or any other heating appliance, more moisture is really needed for your body's requirements...

The ordinary air—outside air—is a little low in moisture anyway because the temperature is low. That air taken in and warmed is going to require more moisture...

Where is it going to get it? Some furnaces make provision for this by having open water tanks, over which the heat passes before it goes up into the rooms...

I spoke once before about a teacher who hung some large troughs filled with water inside the heating vent of the room. The hot air coming over this absorbed moisture, and thus the students would be breathing air and their bodies would be bathed with air, in which there was sufficient moisture for their needs...

Otherwise the over dry air going into the lungs would take too much moisture from the nose and throat and cause sneezing and coughing, which would not only be harmful to the students themselves...

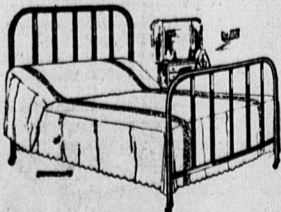
