KING CONSTANTINE MUST GIVE IN

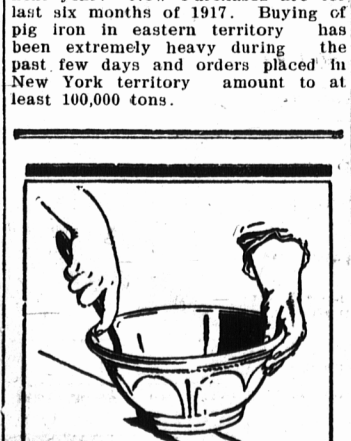
LONDON, November 29.—Vice Admiral Du Fournet, commander of the Allied squadron in Grecian waters, informed King Constantine in an audience given him on Monday that he would firmly adhere to the terms of his ultimatum, says an Athens despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co.

ALLIES BOUND TO BE SUCCESSFUL, (Canadian Press Despatch.) NEW YORK, November 27.—President Joseph G. Butler, Jr., of America, returned from a trip to France and England absolutely convinced of ultimate success of the Allies. He says: "I spent six weeks in France; visited the front; talked with generals of the army, and subordinate officers and private soldiers."

"I believe firmly the Allies will win. I feel certain the Kaiser and the Prussian militarists realize the battle is lost to Germany and are casting about for some means of bringing the war to a close, hoping better terms can be secured now than later."

"The battle of the Marne settled the controversy in favor of France and the Allies. Kitchener predicted a three years' war. From my observations I believe he did not underestimate it. The Allies will never let up until they have won complete and final victory."

ALLIES BUY SHELL STEEL, CLEVELAND, Nov. 28.—Through J. P. Morgan and Co., orders for shell steel amounting to not less than 1,500,000 tons have been placed for export to the Entente Allies.

He said, on his arrival today on the Danish steamer Frederik VIII., from Copenhagen: "The flying machines, he said, would be constructed so as to travel over smooth ice, as well as on water, and will be used for interior explorations starting from the ship which will take his party into Polar regions."

ADMITTS GERMAN LOSSES VERY HEAVY

ZURICH, Nov. 29.—Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, is quoted in the Muencher Meuse, as describing the fighting on the Somme as most sanguinary, and admitting that Germany's losses there have been very heavy.

"We must be prepared for other attacks even more serious, than those resisted heretofore," said the Crown Prince. "It is always an error to underestimate your enemy. I have no means of knowing how long those attacks will continue, but you may rest assured we will not again be taken by surprise."
