NEVERTHELESS AFTERWARD.

"Of all the sad words of tongue or pen the saddest are these, 'It might have been,' and particularly when the words are 'it might have been better.'"

Now that it is all over if any little omissions are picked out and emphasized, if attention is directed to certain things that might have been done and were not, the little mole-hills will become magnified into mountains, the little errors will be transformed into serious blunders and the whole celebration will be regarded, at least from outside the province, as a huge burlesque.

It has been stated that some of the societies were discriminated against in the time and manner of invitation. We learn from Arthur Newbery, Secretary of the Central Committee, that an invitation, of which the following is a copy, was sent on the 17th or the 18th to the recognized representatives of every society in Charlottetown:

"Dear Sir:—The Committee in charge of the Governor General's reception desire that as many of the societies as possible should participate in the proceedings in Charlottetown. Will you kindly inform me not later than Monday next, the 22nd instant whether or not your society will take part. Yours truly, (Signed) Arthur Newbery, Secretary Central Committee."

Some of these invitations were sent out on the 17th and some on the 18th, in the order in which the names of the representatives of each were furnished by Councillor McNeven who had been appointed by the Central Committee for that purpose. Is it fair to charge discrimination in this case? It is true that some of the societies did not take part in the parade. Why they did not is their own business. They were not necessarily disloyal or politically twisted because they saw fit not to participate.

It is charged also that in the appointment of the various committees 'representative men' were ignored. This charge cannot be sustained. It is quite true that there are many representative men who were not appointed; it is equally true that many representative men were appointed. In a country like ours, which is practically filled with representative men or men who regard themselves as such, it would be manifestly impossible to give them all a place on such a committee, and it is an extremely small piece of business to find fault because they were not.

With reference to the military turn out, the mistake, if mistake it was, was in no way chargeable to the Central Committee. At an early stage of the preparations the Minister of Militia was consulted and his permission received to call out the usual military escort provided His Royal Highness should desire it. Instructions were received to provide a mounted escort only and this was done in a manner that most people, at the time, considered sufficient and creditable. When attention is drawn to it it will doubtless be seen that the mounted escort was not as large as it might have been. It was sufficiently large and efficient, however, to elicit from His Royal Highness words of commendation and of appreciation.

There are few human undertakings with the carrying out of which no fault can be found. When the best has been done that can be done, when each has vied with the other to make the occasion worthy of the province and of its distinguished visitors, it is both injudicious and unfair to draw attention to any little errors or omissions that may have occurred; it is even more so to charge political bias and political discrimination. No good can come of it and the sooner such criticism is dropped the better. Both Charlottetown and the province are under the impression that they did their best and that the celebration was a creditable one. Why not let the impression remain as a pleasant souvenir of the vice-regal visit of 1912?

PERU ATROCITIES.

LONDON, August 1.—Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, speaking in the house of commons today on the atrocities in connection with the Rubber industry in the Putumayo district of Peru, said that the British government, did not desire to rest content with making the facts public, but had done all possible thru diplomatic means to impress Peru with the undesirability of permitting such a state of affairs to continue. The British government, he said, is keeping in the closest touch with the United States in this matter and public opinion in the United States would undoubtedly prove a potent factor in preventing a recurrence. It has been arranged for the British and American consuls to leave together on August 6th, for Putumayo, and the consuls presence in that district would be a guarantee that the horrors would not be repeated without the world knowing it.

CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers are on the same footing as non subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or the Rural Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches & than for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc., of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., are chargeable if an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even tho a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Verses accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either morning Daily or Rural Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.
