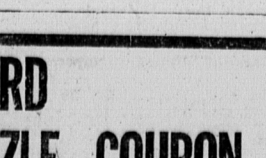

Lost Mailman Reaches Civilization

FORT WILLIAM, Ont. Dec. 17.—Steve Denoski, lost mail carrier of the New Ontario Contracting Co., came out of the woods. Five bitter days and zero nights wandering through the wilderness around Sioux Lookout, without food or matches, records as harrowing an experience as has been heard in the northland in many years.

With the spark of life still glowing, Denoski lies in a Sioux Lookout hospital today. Both legs have been amputated to save his life, his left limb being cut off just below the hip.

Staggering into the lumber camp at dawn Saturday, bushmen were amazed at the spectacle he presented as he crawled on his hands and knees into camp. His legs were cracked with ice, blood trickled from ragged gashes on his body. His clothing was in ribbons, his hands bare and raw from the days and nights wandering knee-deep in snow in the forest.

During his fitful moments of consciousness as he was being pushed to medical attention at Sioux Lookout, lumbermen were able to piece together the story of how Denoski, the mail carrier, lost himself in the woods and found his way out again at the loss of both limbs and perhaps his life.

On Tuesday evening he set out from the Robinson camps, about 10 miles east of Sioux Lookout, to make the round of the lumber camps. During the night he strayed from the beaten trail. Instead of traveling he struck out on what he thought would prove a shortcut.

By morning he was hopelessly lost without food or matches. All day Wednesday he tried to fight his way out, but by nightfall almost giving up hope, he kept warm during the cold bitter night he does not know. He had neither blankets nor fire.

Thursday and Friday were but a repetition of Wednesday. His clothing became torn, exposing him to the cold. He fell in a stream of running water and became sodden in freezing clothing. He struggled on and Saturday morning found civilization.

At 41 He Breaks A Running Record

LONDON, Dec. 16.—A world running record was broken recently by Arthur Newton, the South African farmer-athlete, who ran from London to Brighton, a distance of over 52 miles, in 5 hours 53 min. 43 sec. The previous record for the distance was 6 hours 11 min. 42 sec., set up by himself in October.

Newton, who is in his 42nd year, also broke the 50 miles record for track or road, having passed the 50 miles point in 5 hours 38 min. 42 sec. This time was nearly 15 min. faster than his previous best performance (5 hours 53 min.) in Natal some time ago.

He was far from distressed by this wonderful performance. Running is a fine, easy style, he fights and quite fresh at a speed of well over eight miles an hour. He had a north-west wind to contend with, and a wet, slippery road. The only new element he took was three half-cups of tea.
