EDITORIAL NOTES.

We are pleased to find in the Patriot a reference to the GUARDIAN'S large circulation. It enables us to state what modesty might otherwise have withheld, that the reading patrons of this journal have steadily increased for a long time past, and at no time so rapidly as since our esteemed contemporary has come under its new management.

THE GUARDIAN is pleased to have produced some impression upon the editor of the Patriot. He has become convinced that Charlottetown is more populous than Rocky Point and larger than Southport. We hope yet to convince him that true Liberalism is both broader and better than obstruction. He shows symptoms of a dawning enlightenment—"a bean in darkness, let it grow."

THE GUARDIAN was informed on Saturday that one of the milk vendors, supplying city customers, on having his herd tested by a veterinary, felt it to be his duty to kill one of his cows and place another in quarantine. All credit is due to the owner in question, but the incident confirms our contention that without proper precautions the milk supply may be a source of danger to the public health.

The Trade and Navigation Returns for 1898 show that during the year "settlers' effects" to the value of \$2,828,675 were brought into Canada. Of this total \$2,324,457 consisted of settlers' effects brought from the United States and more than one half of this latter sum was entered in Quebec province. It would appear that the French Canadians who formerly flocked to the States must now be returning in large numbers.

The great Paris Exposition of 1900 is to open in April of that year and close November 5th. Canadian exhibits intended for it must be ready by November 1899; if they are to go forward at the expense of the government. At their own expense Canadian exhibitors may forward articles for display as late as January next. The government will transport exhibits to Paris and back and will also set them up and look after them at the great fair.

We can hardly realise to what extent the by-products of a slaughtered ox are utilised in these days. Boston Journal of Commerce tells that from a good steer may be realised in meat \$40, from the hide, hair horns and hoofs, \$25; from the fats, blood, sinews and bones \$15, from other waste products \$15, or \$55 received from the by-products as against \$40 from the meat. Yet, excepting the hides and meat the most part of what is found now so valuable formerly went waste.

Charlottetown Temperance Alliance.

The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Temperance Alliance was held in the Y. M. C. A. building on Saturday evening. The President took the chair at 8.30 o'clock. There was a large attendance and very much interest was taken in the proceedings. The President reported verbally the proceedings of the past year recounting the part taken by the Alliance in the recent plebiscite campaign, and urging upon the members the necessity of doing something to secure an improved condition of affairs in Charlottetown so far as the traffic in intoxicants is concerned. The treasurer submitted a detailed statement of the expenditures for the year which amounted to \$217.91; receipts the same. The chief items of expense were in connection with the Plebiscite campaign.

A very animated discussion took place in reference to suggested amendments to the present liquor regulation act, several contending that application should be made to the legislature for a local prohibitory law. The majority of the meeting however thought that the efforts for the present should be directed to procuring amendments to the present "Liquor Regulation Act," in the line of shortening the hours of sale prohibiting the sale to minors, forbidding the employment of females to attend in bars, etc. A committee of three was appointed to draft amendments.
