Monthly Meeting Of Summerside Town Council (Special to the Guardian) SUMMERSIDE, May 12—The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held tonight with His Worship Mayor Lidstone presiding over a full Council Board. The proceedings were featured by the approval of the civic budget for the year, presented by Councillor MacNeill, chairman of the Finance Committee. It shows an estimated revenue of \$60,016.96 and an estimated expenditure of \$59,255, leaving a balance of \$761.06. The revenue from property assessment is placed at \$35,028.56, and amongst the estimated expenditures is the sum of \$6,000 for streets. On motion, the tax on real estate and personal property was fixed at \$1.20 per \$100 and the poll tax on male inhabitants at \$3.25, being the same as last year, with exception from poll tax of all returned soldiers, residents of the Town, who served overseas in the Great War of 1914-18. Mr. Fred Barwise having abandoned the position without cause, his appointment as third engineer of the electric plant was cancelled. It was resolved that the license for all dance halls or public places of amusement holding concerts, lectures or operatic performances be set at \$15, also that the electric light rate as served to schools and societies throughout the Town be set henceforth at 50 percent of the commercial rate. It was agreed to place a street light on the east corner of Water St., and East St. Bills amounting to the sum of \$7,715 were passed. Five tenders for the issue of electric light certificates amounting to \$25,000, at 5 percent as recently advertised were read and the highest tender, that of Messrs. Johnston and Ward at \$8.93, was on motion of Councillor MacNeill unanimously accepted. On motion of Councillor Moore it was decided to grant a license for amusement in the Workman's Assn. Hall for \$15 per annum. After a discussion on street matters and the advisability of employing a Town engineer, to take charge of the permanent street work and other duties pertaining to such a position, Council adjourned for twenty-four hours to go further into the matter. Stresses Modern Requirements At the conclusion of the program the chairman stated that the annual meeting of the Hospital takes place a week from next Thursday and asked for a large attendance. He predicted the best report in the history of the institution, but emphasized the fact that increasing opportunities for usefulness bring increased responsibilities. The report will show that the hospital is considerably overcrowded and that there is accommodation for only about twenty-one nurses when there should be at least forty nurses in training. Mr. Rogers appealed to the Protestant public in Queens and Kings Counties to consider very seriously the claims of the Prince Edward Island Hospital. The chairman warmly congratulated the graduating nurses and extended the thanks of the trustee board to the superintendent, Miss Blair and her capable assistant, Miss Howatt; also to the medical staff, and on behalf of the Ladies Aid, to Rev. Mr. Raymond for the use of the Hall, to Miss Earle who supervised the musical program and to all who assisted in making the evening's entertainment a success. Dr. Archibald's Address Dr. C. C. Archibald in addressing the nurses stressed the importance of the occasion, one to be remembered even in the future when some may gain prominence in their chosen profession. The occasion also marks the severing of the connections of the last three years from instructors, classmates, and new friends. "Congratulations are always in order at such a time, and I therefore extend to you my heartiest congratulations, first, on your choice of a profession and the successful termination of these years of study. This is a day when women are giving proof of their fitness to compete with men in almost every line of human endeavour, but in the profession of caring for the sick, woman is, and always has been, supreme. You have given yourselves to a profession which touches human life at every stage." From both surgeon and doctor comes homage to the nurse in tiding human life over its dangerous and trying experiences. The speaker next congratulated the nurses on their graduation adding in this connection: "You have made an excellent beginning, but your training is not finished, for if you wish to be up to date, and well equipped to give your patients the best, you will need to continue your studies and keep in touch with the progress that is being made in your profession. During your stay in hospital you have been subject to a measure of discipline and study, and the regular routine of hospital life has at times been irksome, but soon you will go to your own work making your own choices as to whether you will follow up the same line of systematic study and methods which alone can guarantee success, or on the other hand casting off discipline and honest interest in your profession, which way leads to inefficiency and failure. Allow me to impress upon you the need of regular and thorough methods in your work, now that you are no longer under the control of others. Only in this way can you do justice to the patient, the doctor, and yourselves." Dr. Archibald next referred to the self-sacrificial nature of the nursing profession, the reward of which often will not be financial gain. Success in work does not lie in the mere making of a living, but rather in the giving of a life. "Your patients will not always know this, but you will know, and that thought will ennoble your profession."
