to leave the scene. He said he would remain until the bodies of all his "buddies" had been brought out.  
The mine, 18 years old, is five miles northeast of Sullivan. Its shafts extend 2 1/2 miles toward Sullivan. Harry Keenan, superintendent, said the explosion occurred about 1 3/4 miles from the entrance. Cause of the explosion was not determined immediately.  
Dr. Harvey Crowder, mine surgeon, said he had little hope for recovery of Charles Secreace, 42; Arch Anderson, 35, and Arnold Roberts, 53, all of Sullivan, who were injured critically.  
At Indianapolis Governor M. Clifford Townsend said "all resources of the state will be used to assist the people in this terrible mine disaster."

at which farmers may take the livestock to be classified and marketed with efficiency. These areas will be near water and pasture or fodder.  
Water conservation and establishment of dug-outs and dams, initiated under the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act will be proceeded with. It is hoped, the Minister said, by this method provision will be made to sustain livestock in future years under conditions similar to those existing at present.

**Misconduct At Aldershot Camp Is Alleged**  
KENTVILLE, July 15—Conduct of some of the men at the last Aldershot camp did not respect the decent lives of girls and married women on Kentville streets," asserted Major N. R. Trickey, director of the Salvation Army headquarters at the July meeting of the citizens at the July meeting of the Town Council tonight.  
Rev. Dr. A. R. Donahoe, of St. Joseph's R. C. parish, and H. Harris, president of the Kentville Social Service Council were other members of the delegation.  
"We want and we try to help the boys at all times, but at all times they must respect our women," said Major Trickey.  
The Salvation Army told of a Kentville woman visiting home from the United States had been accosted and openly followed on the streets. He had been informed of other instances of a similar nature, said Major Trickey, a man of many years experience in Salvation Army work in Montreal, and other sections of Canada.  
Rev. Dr. Donahoe, 28 years in charge of St. Joseph's parish, said his information was that women were imposed on by unsavory remarks by members of the last camp. Dr. Donahoe declared he had been reliably informed that two women had been followed by three soldiers right up on the front veranda of the Glebe House. The housekeeper, hearing some noise, came out and the soldiers ran away.  
H. Harris, as did all other members of the delegation, said there had been no complaints against any members of the permanent force and there was no reflection on the present camp membership. He felt, however, that something should be done to avoid the recurrence of the first camp when women were molested.  
Laurie Giblin, garage owner, said he had met three girls on the run. They climbed in his car, immediately after, some men in uniform appeared at the car door. "They might have been just some youngsters out for a frolic, but it just was not the right thing to do," said Mr. Giblin, himself a returned soldier.

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**WAR OFFICE SILENT**  
The War Office did not state how many men or what units were being sent.  
(Chinese reports said three Japanese divisions were crossing the China Sea. A Japanese division varies in strength from 8,000 to 16,000 men.)  
Tientsin dispatches told of continued negotiations in search of a local settlement of the conflict, which began July 7 with a small clash west of Peiping, but officials here indicated they had little prospect of success.  
Japanese consuls at Kalgan, northwest of Peiping, and Talyuan, capital of Shansi Province, were ordered to withdraw and bring all Japanese Nationals with them.

**EVACUATE PEIPING**  
Japanese women and children were being evacuated from Peiping to the seacoast.  
General Gen Sugiyama, war minister, told an emergency session of provincial governors that the North China crisis may take a more serious turn at any moment. He urged the governors to adopt all possible measures to assist mobilization if it should be ordered and to place all resources at the disposal of the army.  
Admiral Mistumasa Yonal, minister of the navy, announced dispositions of warships already made in South China waters as well as in the north to protect or evacuate Japanese Nationals if necessary. Naval vessels also had been sent up the Yangtze River, he said, while units of the main fleet were held in readiness on the home bases to sail for China trouble points if the need arose.
