The latest news, first of all.  
E. Boswell, Victoria, was in the city yesterday.

The mail train arrived in this city last evening at ten o'clock.  
Capt. J. L. Read, of the Earl Grey came to the city last evening from Halifax.

The condition of Arthur Clarke, Jr., City, who is seriously ill, was unchanged yesterday.

It was reported at this office last evening that the light on the gas buoy off Pt. Prim was not burning.

The Northumberland arrived at this port last evening at eight-thirty o'clock. She brought over about six cars of mixed freight and thirteen passengers.

The Secretary of the Y. M. C. A., City, is endeavoring to raise a subscription fund of \$1,000 for the purpose of installing two bowling alleys in connection with that institution.

The Plant Line steamer Halifax went on the Marine Slip yesterday afternoon for painting and cleaning before going on the route between Halifax, Boston and Charlottetown.—Halifax Exe.

A shooting at the traps was advertised to take place yesterday afternoon at V. C. Gay's and was attended by only one party owing to the inclement weather. A well known ammunition firm has donated a quantity of cartridges to be competed for. This sport was well patronized last season and no doubt will prove as interesting this season as last.

The Glenarry Presbytery in special sessions yesterday placed in the hands of Rev. L. Beaton, of Moose Creek, Ont., the call of the Calcutta, P. E. Island congregation to him to become its pastor. A delegation of nine members from Moose Creek opposed the dissolution of the call and Mr. Beaton accepted of the call and the charge will be declared vacant on May 29th. The call was unanimously signed and guarantees a salary of one thousand dollars a year. Mr. Beaton speaks Gaelic freely.—Halifax Exe.

A Halifax Exchange says: "The last few minutes of the sitting of the Alberta commission here proved of a mild sensation, when Walsh read a letter he had received from Thomas R. Whitley, manager of the Royal Bank in Winnipeg, who had subpoenaed, stating that he had been advised by counsel that the commission had no jurisdiction in Manitoba and he would therefore not appear to give evidence. Subsequently the commission authorized I. P. Blando, K. C., to take proceedings against Whitley in a Manitoba court on the charge of contempt. J. F. McMillan, manager of the Royal Bank in Edmonton, is a director of the Canada West Construction company, which is to build the Waterways road. The seven million odd realized from the sale of Alberta and Great Waterways Co., are deposited with that branch of the Royal Bank. Mr. McMillan was formerly of this Province and is well known here.

An important meeting of the forestry committee of the commission of conservation, to consider the question of fires set by railways, was held at the rooms of the commission in Ottawa on Monday afternoon. The following members of the commission were in attendance: Hon. Clifford Sifton, chairman of the commission of conservation, Senator W. C. Edwards, chairman of the forestry committee, Hon. F. L. Bazard, premier of this province, Hon. W. C. H. Crimmer, surveyor general of New Brunswick, Frank Davison and Dr. B. E. Fernow, Ottawa. The committee recommended that certain sections be added to clause 297 of the Railway act providing legislation in cases of fires by sparks from locomotives, etc. The committee further recommended that the act respecting government railways be amended to provide: That the government railways maintain an efficient staff of suitably equipped fire rangers.

# MONTEAL GROWS BY ANNEXATION

At the General Presbyterian Assembly which will be held in Halifax in about three weeks' time the following will represent the Churches in this province:—Rev. M. H. McIntosh, N. Bedeque, Rev. G. E. Ross, Charlottetown, Rev. G. Millar, Alberton, Rev. A. J. McNeill, Murray River, Rev. J. Gillies, Springton, T. C. James, Charlottetown, A. McNeill, New Dominion, and A. S. McKay, Summerside.

There were quite a number of citizens yesterday who were of the opinion that the appointment of a Lieutenant Governor for this province had been recorded and some of them gave credence to the rumor. The Guardian, on making enquiries, elicited the information that nothing had been heard of such appointment in official circles at least. The rumor in some way reached Alberton, and, although no name was given in connection with the story, considerable interest was evoked.

**TWICE FIRE SWEEP.**  
TOPPED, ALA., May 4.—This town was fire swept Tuesday for the second time in its history. The fire started at three o'clock and did \$20,000 damage in the business section.

**HOISE NOTE.**  
The celebrated brood mare Parkville No. 8795, owned by D. M. Martin, Brackley Point Road, dropped a foal on the 30th April, sired by Oakley Baron. It is considered his best foal yet.

**QUEBEC, May 4.**—Today was an annexation day in the private bills committee of the legislature. No less than seven municipalities and districts constituting four new wards, and representing miles of territory and thousands of people were added to Greater Montreal. The terms of annexation in every case were approved by the mayor and controllers and adherents who are in the city, and were collected to be advantageous to Montreal.

The town of Rosemount had granted a large contract in anticipation of annexation, but the representatives of the town agreed to cancel this contract and terms were agreed upon. Opposition was offered before the committee, however, to taking this town, and the question was suspended until Tuesday next. The other municipalities annexed included Louisa, Pointe, Ville Emard, Cote, Des Neiges, Bourcaux, Jean Rivage, and Tremadville.

**KINGSTON DRY-DOCK LEASE.**  
KINGSTON, Ont., May 4.—The lease of the Government dry-dock was taken over yesterday by the Kingston Ship-building Company. The lease holds for 21 years at \$10,000 a year.

**PETERBORO, Ont., May 4.**—Timely action on the part of G. C. it, section men last evening saved the life of Clarence Robinson, two year old son of John Robinson of this city. The child wandered on to the track in the part of the 5:20 westward G. C. train and stood in the middle of the track. Robinson saw the boy and hearing the train whistle rushed down the track towards the child waving their arms as they ran. The engineer saw their signals and threw on the emergency brakes with the result that the train was securely moving when it struck the child.
